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### CAN FIND NO EVIDENCE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

#### That Bruce Holder's Wound Was From a Rifle Bullet.

The management committee of the Board of Education has made a most careful inquiry into the case of the alleged shooting at the Kingston Collegiate Institute when Bruce Holder, a young student, was supposed to have been injured. The final evidence was heard on Wednesday evening. Those appointed to look into the matter were unable to find that there was any carelessness on the part of the supervisor of rifle practice at the collegiate or that the alleged bullet wound was even caused by a bullet at all. The committee is unable after most careful investigation to obtain any direct testimony to show that the lad was injured by a rifle bullet and may have received the slight scratch from some other cause and failed to notice it at the time of the occurrence.

#### ALFRED PATTERSON SENT UP FOR TRIAL

#### Fractured Harold Reynolds' Skull—Injured Man Struck Him First.

On Thursday morning Alfred Patterson, Crow Lake, appeared before Justice of the Peace J. W. Bradshaw on the charge of assaulting and doing bodily harm to Harold Reynolds. At the present time Reynolds is confined to the General Hospital suffering from a fractured skull. Patterson was committed to stand trial the second week in June.

Joseph McEwen, who was working with Reynolds and Patterson when the assault was committed at Crow Lake station, stated that Reynolds was working outside of the car and Patterson was inside. The two were arguing about some contract, witness said Reynolds called Patterson a liar. Patterson jumped out of the car and they both clinched. The two separated, and Reynolds grabbed a stick, four feet long and two inches thick, and struck Patterson. The latter took the stick away from Reynolds and struck him on the head.

#### POLICE ON THE JOB; WOMAN WILL PAY RENT

#### A Citizen Threatened With a Gun Gets His Money.

It takes the law to regulate things. On Wednesday morning a citizen complained to the police that a woman had pointed a rifle at him and ordered him out of the house when he called to collect his rent. But for his loud cries for help, he might have been whirled round the shaft. His companions, seeing his predicament, ran and threw off the gear and rescued him. He was conveyed to his residence at the corner of Earl and Division streets, and a doctor called to attend him. An examination showed that two ribs were fractured.
