

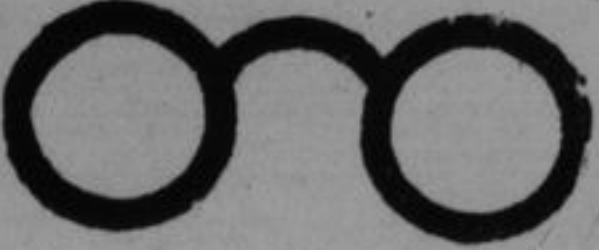

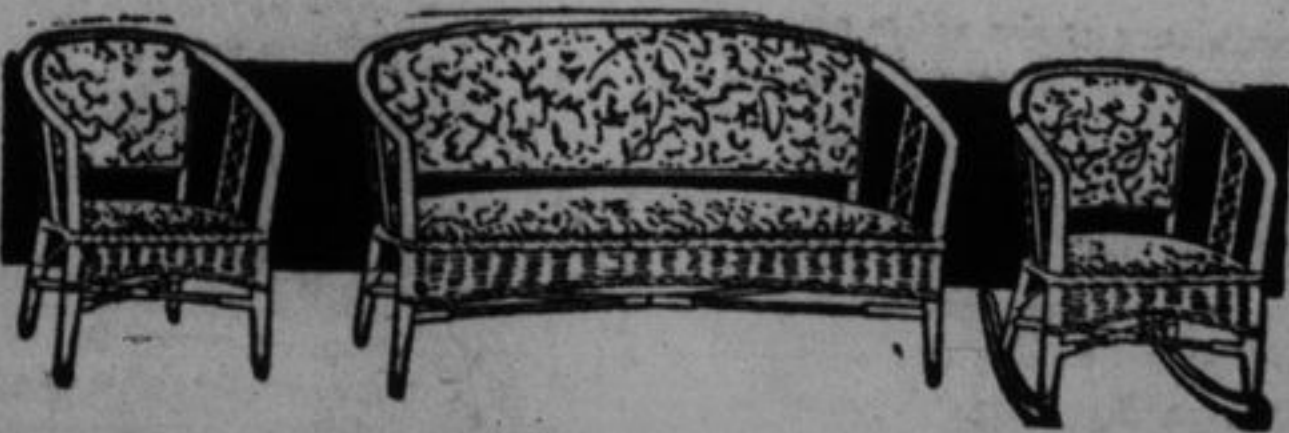

Maritimes May Lose Seven Federal Seats

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—The effect of a possible further curtailing of the representation in the House of Commons of the maritime provinces in the event of the redistribution is causing interest. Under the last redistribution, New Brunswick was given eleven seats, Nova Scotia sixteen, and Prince Edward Island four, and while the island province representation cannot be further curtailed, it is possible that an increase in the population of Quebec without a corresponding increase in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia may result in the first province losing one representative and the latter six.

TO CONSTRUCT CATACOMBS.

Madrid, Feb. 24.—The Diario Universal announces the proposed construction at Cerro Angeles, the geographical centre of Spain, of great catacombs to cover five square kilometres, which will be named "the City of the Dead," and where all Catholics in Spain are to be buried. The structure is to be surmounted by an iron cross three hundred feet high, from which daily masses for the dead will be said.

ALLIES WILL STOP MUNITION EXPORT

South America Will Not be Allowed to Buy Material From Germany.

London, Feb. 24.—The Allied Control Commissions in Germany will prohibit shipments of war materials from Germany to Argentina or any other neutral country if such countries persist in trying to buy munitions. This announcement was made in British official circles here to-day. It was stated that despite the reply that the Versailles treaty prohibits Germany from manufacturing or exporting war materials, no drastic measures were needed now for enforcing the prohibition on shipments to Argentina, but it was said continued efforts to obtain the same would bring the Allied commissions to full exertion of their duties.

While it was appreciated that Argentina, like other neutrals would appreciate the advantage of bargain in war supplies it was declared this was impossible in view of the treaty. Efforts to obtain supplies would only embarrass the Allies and Germany, and particularly the latter, which had enacted measures to forestall such shipments as were reported to be clearing for South America it was said.

CANADIAN VESSEL'S STRUGGLE AT SEA

Disabled Signaller Crawled Into Port, Overdue, Without Food or Fuel.

Boston, Feb. 24.—Every scrap of food on board was gone and the coal bunkers were virtually empty when the steamer Canadian Signaller arrived here from Fowey, England, a week overdue. She has fought her way through storm after storm on the Atlantic. Officers and crew were exhausted.

The last three days of the ship's voyage were by dead reckoning and only yesterday was her position made known to her by navy wireless after her Boston agents had sought word of her. In mid-ocean her engine broke down and for hours the vessel was tossed about at the mercy of the sea.

The last of the Canadian Signaller's food supply was consumed yesterday. There was no breakfast aboard this morning. The vessel, one of the Canadian merchant marine fleet, brought a cargo of China clay.

CRISIS MORE SERIOUS.

Suffering and Hardship in Russia Aro Intensified.

Riga, Feb. 24.—The full crisis in Russia daily is growing more serious, according to reports received here from Moscow. The prices of bread, sugar and butter have risen to almost unbelievable heights. Meat is said to be almost unobtainable.

The large official population of Moscow, including members of the Red Army and of the secret service, see in the curtailment of transportation the worst possible calamity for the already depleted supplies of the city populations. They declare this would result in the looting of food trains on their way to Moscow and Petrograd, soldiers and civilians joining in the plundering, and that as a result the trains would arrive in the large cities half empty.

WEST INDIES ANGRY.

Fed Up With American Talk of Cession by Britain.

Kingston, Jamaica, Feb. 24.—The Gleaner, commenting on a resolution in the American Senate of Senator Reed to ascertain whether Great Britain is willing to consider the cession of all or any part of Great Britain's possessions in the West Indies to America, says:

"These frequent questions and suggestions about us are beginning to get on the nerves of British West Indians and of the people of England. Why should a great Empire wish to sell any part of itself?"
