M'GILL GIVEN DECISION INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

In the Intercollegiate Debate With Queen's on Thursday Evening.

McGill debaters were given the decision over Queen's in the final intercollegiate debate held in Convocation hall Thursday evening before a fair sized audience. The judges, Judge E. C. Huycke, Professor Prof. C. E. Auger, of Victoria College, Toronto, and R. T. Brynner, of the Bank of Commerce, Kingston, were not considering the decision some time before Judge Huycke, after congratulating both sides, announced that by a slight margin the decision was in favor of the negative, which was supported by McGill.

The subject of debate was "Resolved that legislation should be sought to secure abolition of Canadian appeals to the judicial committee of the Privy Council." The affirmative was upheld by R. O. Campney and F. A. Knox, Queen's, and the negative by W. R. Dillon and R. Perrault, McGill. All the speakers showed that they had spent much time in preparation, and the judges remarked that their debates were a credit to the institution which they represented. The affirmative said in part that the privy council was out of date, that it did not give justice to all on account of the expense, and that the councillors did not have the knowledge of local conditions necessary to give a fair judgment in some cases. The negative, on the other hand, maintained that the council was a court where matters of constitutional importance could be settled and in the case of Quebec was a necessary body.
