147,502 ENTERED CANADA LAST YEAR. Of This Number of Immigrants 50,000 Were From United States.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—During last year the total immigration to Canada from sixty-four different countries, was 147,502, of which almost 50,000 entered from the United States. These figures were made public to-day by the department of immigration, colonization, and marked an increase of over fifty thousand over the previous year.

During the year 49,000 English, 19,000 Scotch and 6,000 Irish landed in Canada. Immigration from central Europe was fairly heavy.

LUNDY'S LANE CHURCH. An Historic Site In Connection With Canadian Methodism.

The 126th anniversary of Lundy's Lane Methodist Church was observed on Sunday, November 14. On this historic ground, Methodism was first planted by the United Empire Loyalists, before the literacy system began, the first preacher being a soldier, Major George Neal, who preached and formed the first class meeting in 1788. He was not kindly received, and accounts relate that he was pecked with stones until the blood poured down his face. Methodism of Upper Canada, at this time, had a number of years afterwards, was connected with the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, as established by Wesley at the close of the revolutionary war. From 1791 until 1794 different preachers came along, each preaching where he could find hearers and form his converts into classes. Three years afterwards, circuit riders were formed, the Niagara circuit taking in Lundy's Lane, with Jarvis Dunham as the first minister who journeyed for miles from one place to the other on horseback preaching the gospel. Thomas Whitbread, who followed, in order to reach Niagara from Albany in 1806, had a journey of six weeks living on nothing but wheat by the way. As the years passed other preachers came until the breaking out of the war in 1812, when many of the ministers stationed in Canada returned to the United States. The "old red meeting house" in Lundy's Lane was built some time after the war, about 1820.

A plot of ground of about two acres was donated by Charles Green, a United Empire Loyalist, and at the west end of Lundy's Lane the church Methodist churches erected in Canada. The "old red meeting house" stood as a landmark for many years, and was the scene of the meeting of the general conference, when preachers from all parts of Canada and the United States assembled there. Reaching conferences in those days was a work of toil and danger—there was a preacher was drowned in the Susquehanna River, while on his way to the meeting. More than a hundred traveling preachers assembled under the presidency of the American bishop, Enoch George. The public services were largely attended, where six years before these men fought on opposite sides near this spot in the fierce battle of Lundy's Lane. When the last day of the conference came, the preachers brought their horses saddled ready to start. The appointments were made by the bishop and each man without a murmur would start for his new field, in whatever circuit he was sent.

In the year 1844 a new edifice was built on the site of the present building, but those who had so long worshipped in the "Old Red Meeting House" felt that they were loathe to leave it, and from the year 1844 until 1857 services were held in both churches. In 1857 services were discontinued in the Red Meeting House and held in the new church. John Ker, who moved from Merriton to Lundy's Lane, organized a Sunday school, which was the first of its kind in Sunday school with the Presbyterians. Rev. Mr. Dickson had charge from 1857 to 1860, and was succeeded by Rev. John Wakefield, who conducted a revival meeting for thirteen weeks, in 1858, the church was enlarged. In 1858 the church now standing was built, the old building being found too small. Rev. P. Hobbs was in charge. The last service held in the old church took place on Sunday, April 18, 1858, when nine babies were christened. The cornerstone of the present church was laid May 24, 1858, and was completed in November of the same year.

Pink Salmon. Canadian householders are buying salmon by color rather than by quality, according to Dr. Edward Prince, chairman of the Biological Board of Canada, who states that the best flavored salmon on the Pacific coast is in small demand because the color is pale. The inferior salmon, which is of a rich red color, brings the best price, and takes first place on the Canada market. The price of pink salmon is stated to be about one-half the price of the red. The sockeye, known as the red salmon, is in great demand, and the species is threatened with ultimate extinction, and there is a consequent rise in prices. The pink and chum salmon caught in British Columbia are almost unusable in Canada.

During the recent salmon fishing season in British Columbia, Alaska fisheries were shipping their red salmon to British Columbia canners, while British Columbia fisheries were shipping the pinks and chums to United States canneries, because there was a demand for this class of fish across the border.
