In Memory of John Wilfred Whalen.
A gloom spread over Cataragui and district when it was learned on Sunday night that Wilfred Whalen was dead. He answered his country's call to arms and enlisting in 1915 served in the 59th Battalion, later transferred to the 26th, C.E.F. Early in the spring of 1918, while in the trenches in France, the fumes of deadly gas planted in his system the roots of the fatal disease which later claimed him. He entered the Mowat Memorial Hospital seven months after arriving home, and for a time seemed to improve and came to his home, but was obliged to go back in January. He sank rapidly, and early in February it was seen his end was near, and friends hurried from distant cities to be with him. On the evening of the 20th, surrounded by wife and small daughters, he quietly breathed his last. His wife and little girls, Beatrice and Hazel, aged ten and eleven; his father, two brothers, Bernard, of Detroit, and Leo, of Rochester, two sisters, Mrs. McGowan, Saginaw, Mich., and Mrs. Wager, Detroit; a brother-in-law, Thos. Crow, Rome, N.Y., survive.

The funeral on Wednesday left his home by motor followed by friends. On arriving in the city the casket was transferred to the gun carriage, and covered with the flag he gave his life to save, preceded by full military escort, first to St. Mary's Cathedral, where a solemn requiem mass was sung by Father Farrell, the procession then reformed. On arriving at the cemetery the priest read the burial service, the firing squad lined up, a volley was fired, the bugles sounded the last post and all that was mortal of Wilfred Whalen was laid in the vault to await interment in the spring.
