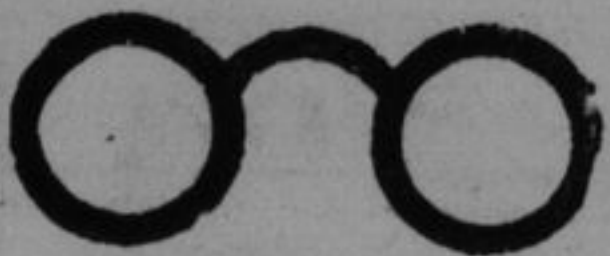

**BRITAIN READY TO PERMIT THE MEETING**

Willing for Elected Irish Representatives to Consider Proposals.

London, March 5.—Answering questions in the house of commons, Lloyd George said he was perfectly willing to give facilities to the elected representatives of the Irish people to meet to present proposals to the government or to come by way of a deputation, but there were certain persons who could not be permitted to meet or take part in the deputation, namely those who had taken part directly in murder.

Hon. J. Devlin asked whether any reservations in the character were made to the representatives of the Boers when asked to meet the British government, and whether some of the things done by the representatives of the Boers could not be described as similar to those done in Ireland (cries of "no, no").

Mr. Lloyd George replied with emphasis that it was an insult to the government of South Africa to suggest there was any comparison between the men who fought openly in the field with the men who parade the streets in civilian dress, under the protection of the law, and then turn round and shoot the guardians of the law.

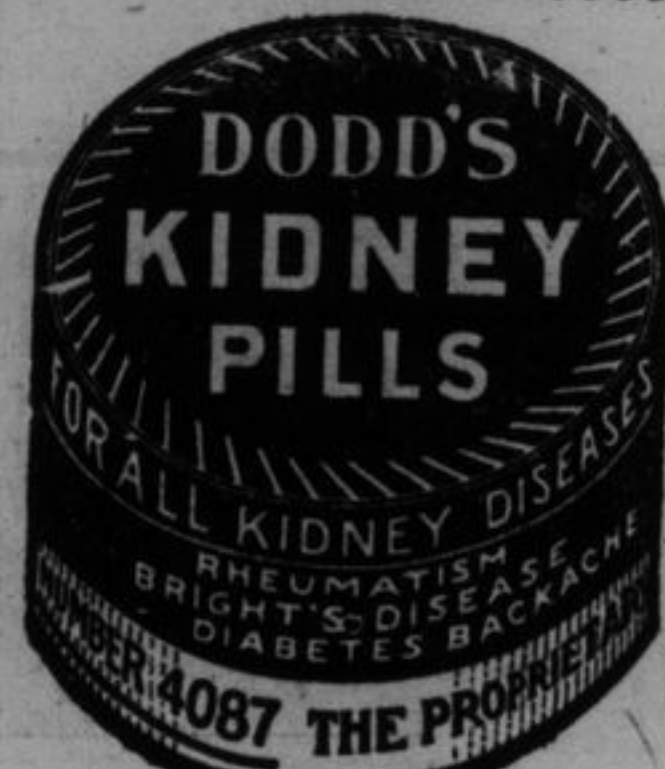

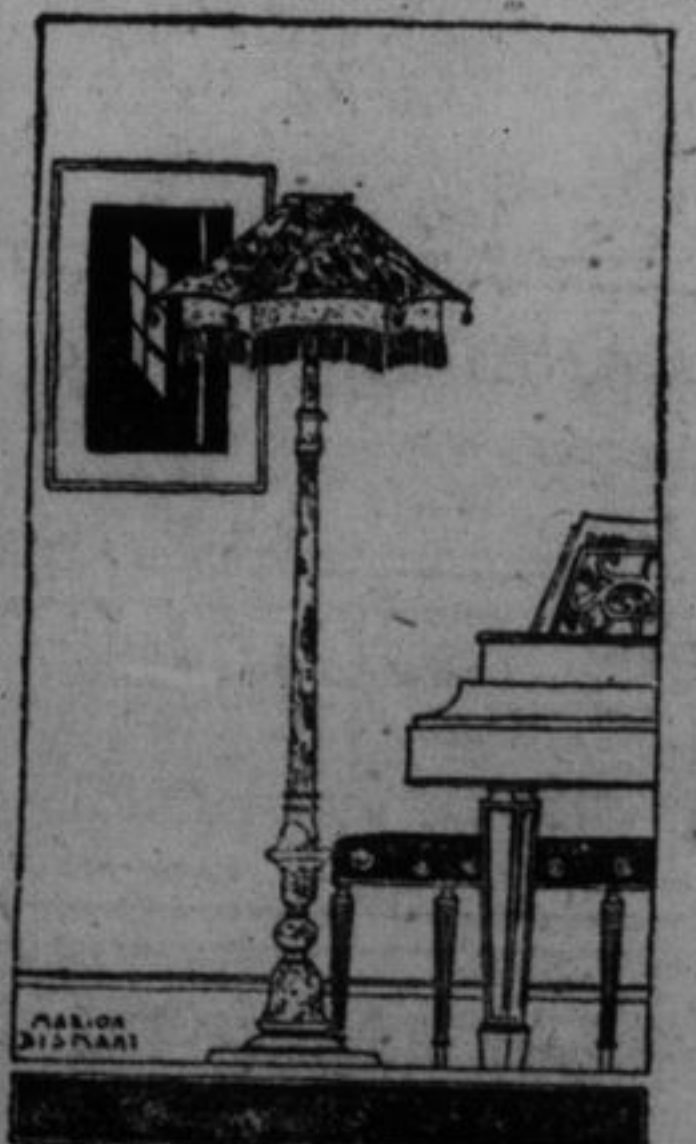
