FOR PUNISHMENT

Federation of Industries Urge Simons to Remain Firm-Ready for Penalties.

Berlin, March 5 .- Following the eccipt of the news of the London Conference, the German press is preparing the public for the breaking off of negotiations and its . Insequences. At the same time desperate efforts are being made to convince the peode that penalties cannot be put into orce before May 1st without violaion of the Versailles Treaty.

The Federation of German Indusries has urged Dr. Simon to remain firm, stating that it is fully prepared for the consequences, however ser ous. A similar resolution has been assed by the Essen mu icipal council with the support of Socialists and communists, who affirm that the Paris demands "mean a death sentence on the German people," and that the workers of Westphalia quite realize the consequences of rejection and are ready to bear them.

The organs in the industrial cenres, however, betray disappointment at the apparent refusal of the Allies to allow a detailed discussion of the morandum, prepared by Rathenau innes and other magnates. This ontains a sentence that reparation cannot be treated as the problem o one country, but must be regarded as the problem of "a newly-construct ed world economic system."

It was on this basis that they hoped to put forward their scheme of international industria: producing and selling syndicates, ostensibly designed to make reparation without dumping, but really intended to insure the development of German industries by making the industries of all counries independent
