 The skating rink commonly known as Boulter's arena, has changed ownership. Messrs. John Hubbs and W. H. Benson have purchased it from John W. Whattam, the late owner, who bought it from G. E. Boulter about two years ago. The curling club may finally get it. The price was \$6,500.

Had Hand Poisoned.
 Mrs. William Sills, Belleville, taken to the hospital on Saturday suf-

The young couple were making a farewell visit before taking their departure to their new home at Beamsville, where they intend to take up their residence on a fruit farm.

Picton Has Oldest Mason.
 John Huff, Picton, is probably the oldest mason in Canada. He joined Prince Edward Lodge on March 1st, 1849, and has therefore been a member of the craft for seventy-two years. Mr. Huff joined when he was twenty-four years of age and is now ninety-six years old. He is still remarkably active and walks down town quite frequently. Mr. Huff's early home was at Salmon Point.

Passed Away at Newburgh.
 Mrs. Frank W. Tompkins, Newburgh, passed away at her residence on Wednesday last, after an illness of about ten days from pneumonia. Deceased had been an invalid for the past four years, but was thought to be improving, when pneumonia developed. She is survived by her husband, three sons and one daughter, also her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. D. Vanastine, Napanee. The funeral took place from her late residence on Friday afternoon.

Death of A. A. Miller.
 Albert Anson Miller, one of Fredericksburgh's oldest residents, passed away on Feb. 27th. Deceased was born at Bath, and was the son of the late Peter and Esther Miller. He is the last to pass away of a family of ten. Mr. Miller made his home for the last thirty years with Robert Madden, on the York Road, near Napanee. Mr. Miller was seventy-nine years of age, and was smart till the last. Although he has been blind for nine years, he was always of a cheery disposition and will be greatly missed by all who knew him, adds the Napanee Express. Mr. Miller was never married. Andrew, Robert and Ben. Miller, of Bath, are nephews.

decrease of \$31,162,712, compared with last year. The amount chargeable to revenue is \$384,386,715, and a capital \$27,469,127. The additional amount of \$7,777,380 for demobilization produces the total above stated. The railway estimates are large. Those of the Grand Trunk are greater than those of any other systems. The analysis of the Grand Trunk situation indicates that some \$57,000,000 will be required.

This is not, however, merely attributable to operating deficits, as the Grand Trunk is faced with current and overdue liabilities amounting to \$20,000,000, as well as substantial payments which will have to be made for sinking fund and for refunding purposes. In addition to this the Grand Trunk operating officers estimate that a new capital expenditure of \$12,000,000 should be made.

The estimates provide \$26,000,000 for the Grand Trunk Pacific, of which \$11,250,000 is for operating deficit, and some \$8,000,000 for interest requirements and fixed charges. Some \$6,000,000 is provided for betterment.

C. N. R. Requirements.
 The Canadian National requirements are made up of operating deficit of \$7,000,000 on the Intercolonial and Transcontinental railway and \$23,000,000 for operating deficit and fixed charges on Canadian Northern. The operating deficit in this case amounting to between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000, and interest and fixed charges constituting the balance. The vote is swollen by betterment, new construction on western lines and stock requirements. It is explained therefore that the net result is that the total railway obligations requiring cash are some \$140,000,000, as against the \$117,800,000 for which an appropriation is asked.

The canal estimates include a vote of five million for the Welland, \$100,000 for the Hudson Bay Railway, and \$339,000 for the Trent canal.

For Public Works.
 Under the head of public works, the votes includes for harbor improvement \$1,300,000 at Esquimaux (drydock), \$170,000 at Fort William, \$136,000 at Quebec, \$1,250,000 at St. John, \$1,000,000 at Toronto, and an additional \$175,000 for protection for the Toronto breakwater. For public buildings the estimates are cut to the bone and are mainly for repairs. The same policy is followed with regard to piers, wharves and breakwaters. The site for the naval service is placed at \$3,726,990, an increase of \$391,480. Under the head of public works chargeable to capital the estimates include \$523,000 for the St. Lawrence Channel, \$8,350,000 for government shipbuilding and \$2,000,000 for a new ice-breaker. For soldiers' re-establishment the vote is \$19,310,000, for pensions \$31,814,923 and for militia \$11,80,000. Public works charged to income are \$13,373,755, a de-

crease of two and quarter millions. The air board gets \$1,625,000 and soldiers' land settlement \$35,000,000.

Miscellaneous votes apart from the usual ones include: \$50,000 for Canadian representation at Washington; \$58,000 for the Canadian Press Ltd.; \$2,000,000 for administration of the Business Profits and Income Tax act.

Ten millions for housing, \$905,000 for soldiers' graves commission, \$209,000 for League of Nations secretarial; pensions \$75,000,000 five millions and the re-establishment vote by twenty-four millions.

The main feature of the estimates is the hole eaten in the revenue by the railways, causing everything else to be cut down to the limit.

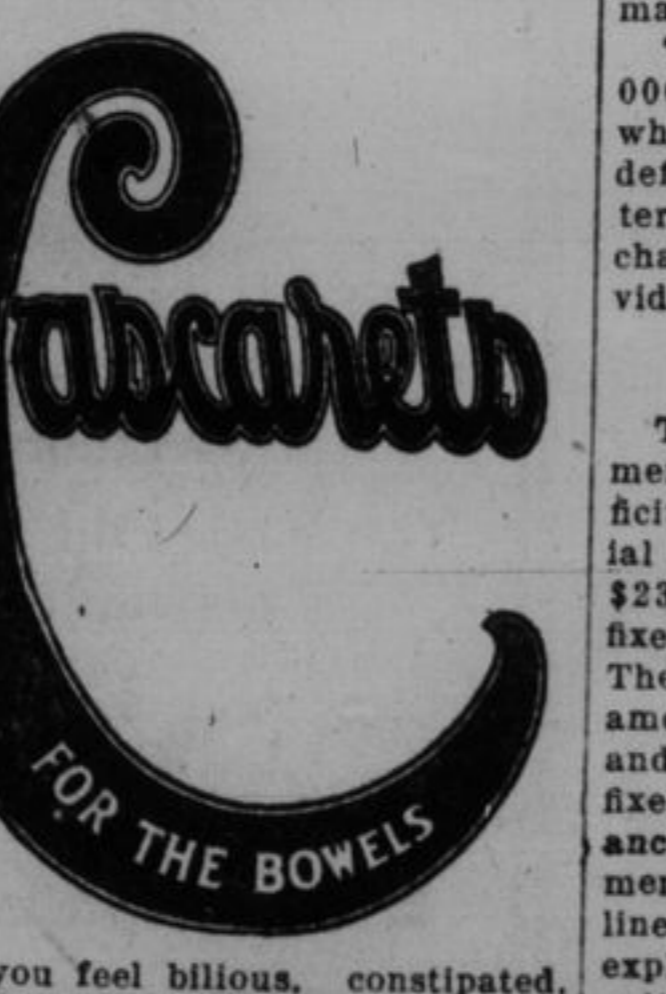
