Struck By Train But Will Live

Struck by a G. T. R. freight train while walking on the track, but still alive and looking forward to complete recovery, is the position of T. J. Featherston, late of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who saw hard service in France during the war. Featherston undertook to walk from Toronto to Kingston after being out of work in Toronto for some time, and being without funds. He got as far as Collie's Bay, six miles west of Kingston. While walking on the track he was hit by the east-bound freight and thrown to the side of the track. The train was stopped and he was taken on board and brought to the Kingston Junction where he was attended by Dr. Crowley. He was found to be cut about the head and had several ribs broken. He was removed to the Hotel Dieu. Featherston says he never heard the approach of the train and thinks that he must have been dozing, or half asleep as he trudged along the track about 8.30 a.m. He was born in England, but has been several years in Canada. He enlisted in the 60th Battalion.

Firm Made a Mistake In the Price Quoted

There was a special meeting of the utilities commission, Thursday morning, with regard to the contract awarded McKelvey & Birch, Limited, for supplying cast iron pipe for the water extension to houses on the York road outside the city limits. The contractor stated that they had made a mistake in their figure of \$1,207, which was \$233 below the next tender. The commission realized at the time the figure was given that it was rather low, and Thursday agreed on a compromise. Fifty dollars will be added to the firm's quotation.

Resolution Agreed To.
In parliament a resolution was placed on the order paper by Joseph Archambault, Chambly-Vercheres, which proposes that speeches delivered in French in the house shall be translated into English and published in a special sheet of Hansard every Monday. Montreal, March 10.—Major Robert W. Griffiths, self-confessed slayer of William A. Holland, Montreal stock broker, who was shot and mortally wounded on January 14th, in the office of Macdonough brothers, of which firm he was manager, was this morning found to be unfit by reason of insanity to stand trial for murder, and will, therefore, be confined until instructions as to his future are received from the lieutenant-governor. This was the finding of the special jury in the court of King's Bench this morning.
