### ADDRESS TO KIWANIAN

By Prof. Clarke, of Queen's, on Present Trade Conditions.

H. W. Newman, delegate of the Kingston Kiwanis Club to the Montreal meeting last week, gave his own report on the trip at the Monday meeting of the local club and endeavored to impart to his hearers some of the enthusiasm he received from the Montreal Kiwanians and the international secretary, an American citizen, who spoke well on the part of the Canadian players in the great war. He was tendered a vote of thanks by the president for the very able manner in which he represented the Kingston Kiwanians and for his splendid speech. Those who accompanied him were Messrs. Corbett, Mills, Robertson, Sargent, Bushell.

The feature of the day was the boosters toast. Steacy's Limited securing prominence in a most unique manner. B. N. Steacy's generosity in the distribution of prizes vied with Santa Claus himself. There were five valuable prizes. The first and second were ladies' silk stockings that went to Percy Holton and Stewart Robertson; third, a beautiful pair of gloves, to J. McL. Stephen, Major-General Sir A. C. Macdonell, the lucky holder of the fourth ticket, received a great surprise when upon opening the box containing his prize he found a pair of ladies' corsets, real ones, all trimmed with lace. J. C. Eaton, Canada Cutlery Company, won the fifth prize, a pair of baby's booties, with a card: "Coming events cast their shadows before." All of the recipients were warmly applauded as they exhibited their prizes.

Prof. Clarke, commerce department, Queen's University, gave a highly interesting talk on present trade conditions as viewed by economists. We are just now going through a trade crisis said the speaker, and we are beginning to reach the bright side. After describing the successive trade depressions of the past thirty years, he said that they were due to three phases of all business enterprise viz. the boom at the start, the crest of the wave and third, the depression that always follows. We passed through a depression that struck the west in 1912-13 and were just picking up when the war came with an artificial stimulation of war expenditures that kept up to armistice time when there was a slight break. It was not long, however, for the boom began again in 1919. Describing conditions in European countries where there is an enormous inflation of currency, inflation reached its highest last summer, and broke first in Japan in the silk markets and then struck all countries. In Canada there have been comparatively few failures in business due to our splendid banking system. The drop in prices is rapid so far, but there is some distance to travel yet to reach pre-war prices and to get back to a stable basis. Some few commodities have gone below normal but some have not reached normal.

such as iron, steel and building materials, freight rates, and wages. These are out of harmony with the general level of prices. The speaker read an extract from the weekly letter of the Royal Bank of Canada confirming his own statements. Our credit system has been under a tremendous strain but it is still intact, as also is our banking system. Credit tightening which the banks started was not as bad as in other countries and the banks were able to help firms through and prevent failures. In consequence of this, the labor situation was not as bad as it might have been, and we have not had much distress. There has been some liquidation of wages without much disturbance but there must be further liquidation. The temper of business men today is better than it was during the last few months. They know that the country is not going to the dogs, and all business men are confident.

Prof. Clarke handed out the following advice, "Keep things moving by weeding out all dead and old stock as rapidly as possible." We must have current consumption taking care of current production to keep the machinery going. The worst is over and the outlook for the immediate future is good according to Harvard reports, which look for a spring recovery. We in Canada are in a better position than any other country today with the possible exception of the United States. Chairman Frank Hoag tendered a very warm vote of thanks to Prof. Clarke.
