

Laurier Naval Policy Followed by Admiralty

London, March 16 .- An admiralreferring to the naval policy for consideration at the coming imperial conference, says that the lines on which it is proposed to proceed are toward the development of dominion navies under the administrative and executive command of their own officers, each navy being a responsibility for its own government, all working, however, under the guidance of a common doctrine to insure intelligent co-operation in a universal system of staff training necessary. It is proposed that a certain number of dominion officers shall each year take a course in the naval staff college, the dominions eventually establishing their own staff colleges under the same system.
