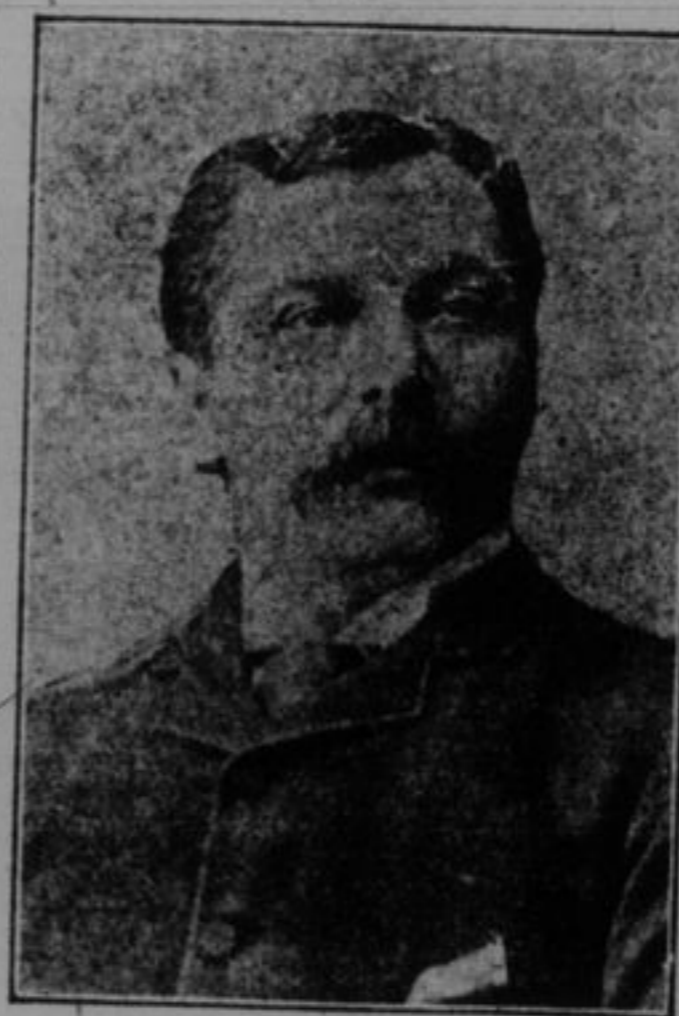

Deed of Church Property.
 An investigation into the Church of England property at Prescott shows that it consists of four town lots, 12 and 13 N. S. Dibble and 12 and 13 S. S. James, and these were deeded by the late Susannah Jessup to the Rev. Robert Blakey, Justus S. Merwin, Walter F. Gates and Thomas Hughes, in consideration of five shillings and the building of a church. Hughes was likely the man who built the Windmill in 1823 or 4. Walter F. Gates was a prominent merchant at Johnstown. All are dead and there has not been any records since the deed to them in 1822. The title will have to be vested likely in the Synod of Ontario by a private bill of the legislature at Toronto. The same or similar facts apply to the Blue church plot.
