James, and these were deeded by the late Susannah Jessup to the Rev. Robert Blakey, Justus S. Merwin, Walter F. Gates and Thomas Hughes, in consideration of five shillings and the building of a church. Hughes was likely the man who built the Windmill in 1823 or 4. Walter F. 
