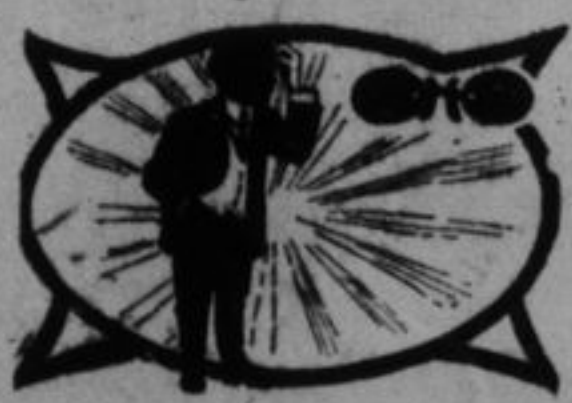

THE ST. ANDREW'S CADETS

This Smart Kingston Highland Corps is Now Being Re-organized.

With a profound conviction that the destiny of every Canadian boy should be interwoven with the destiny of the British Empire, steps are being taken towards the re-organization of the St. Andrew's highland cadets. It is several years since Kingstonians have seen the highland cadets parade the streets in their smart and picturesque uniform, and the disbandment of this truly famous Scottish cadet corps was attended by many expressions of regret. News of its re-organization will therefore be gratifying to all citizens.

In view of the expense of the traditional kilts, it is proposed to outfit the Cadets in tartan trousers, red sashes and Balmoral bonnets, and, at a later date, when the financial condition of the corps warrants the expenditure, to adopt the glorious Scottish highland dress, consisting of Kilmarnock bonnet and feather, kilt, sporran, plaid and white spats.

The first company of the corps has now been enrolled and official approval requested for the re-organization. A second company will be formed when No. 1 company has been clothed and equipped.

Lord Atholstan, one of our most distinguished Canadians, has taken a kindly interest in the corps, and has expressed his wish to equip one of the cadets.

ADDRESSED WORKINGMEN

On Labor Conditions in the Canadian West.
Prof. W. C. Clarke, of Queen's University, addressed the workingmen in the trades and labor hall on Thursday evening on industrial matters out west. He said he believed in trades union and employers organizations. He believed there should be collective bargaining, where master and man could get together around a table and talk as man to man. In speaking of employers of industrial workers out west, he said they were very individualistic, that is they disliked collective bargaining and disliked organization of any kind.

In speaking of western trades' union leaders he said they were nearly all old country men, and most of them were well educated and well able to hold their own in a debate. Employers of industrial workers out west had very little experience in industrial matters as the west was not an industrial centre like the larger cities in the east such as Toronto and Montreal. He placed the labor leaders into two classes, extremists and moderates. Whether the dreams and aspirations of the extremists would ever come true he was not prepared to say, but he thought they were in some things too far ahead of the times.

In speaking of the rank and file, he said there was a diversity in their make-up; they were made up of many foreign elements and that the greater majority of the laborers in the west had socialistic tendencies. If you talked to them of political action they would laugh at you, as their work was kind of migratory—that is they worked part of their time in the cities and part in the logging camps, so that they never stayed long enough in any one place to get a vote.
