### Be Efficient.

(Montreal Gazette) It is noted in the Toronto Globe that the Toronto Builders' Exchange reports that an increase in the efficiency of labor has resulted in a considerable reduction in building costs and that as a result contractors are able to put in lower bids on construction work. The Fuller Corporation of New York, earlier in the year, noted that contractors, like manufacturers, were rejoicing in a decrease in labor unit costs, due to a marked increase in the efficiency of labor, even though the wage scale was unchanged. The situation thus indicated is interesting. It is the work done, not the hours spent on it, that counts in the cost. High efficiency can maintain high wages.

### War Veterans Victory.

(Ottawa Journal) Judging by the waiting at Berlin over the propositions of the allied powers in regard to reparations and indemnity, war has ceased to be a noble ideal in Germany. If the pre-war conceptions and lucubrations of the then popular philosophers, historians, poets and militarists in Germany were to be taken still at their face value, the war was such a splendid thing in principle, no matter what its result was, that Germany ought really to be delighted even now to pay almost any price for it. But appearances are that the ideas of these philosophers and historians, poets and militarists do not arouse enthusiasm in Berlin at present.

(New York Times) Lloyd George retains his immense majority in the House of Commons. Even if all the elements of the Opposition could be united, they would not be powerful enough to turn him out. Unless his spirit and ambition break and sicken him of his public work, the chances are that he will hold on until he thinks he sees a chance to force suddenly a general election under conditions as favorable as those which enabled him to win a smashing victory in 1918.
