Montreal. Cattle receipts, 315. There were no choice cattle on sale. Receipts were every light and prices firmer. The top price was \$10.25 paid for fourteen steers averaging 1,250 lbs. The majority of the good butchers' cattle, both steers and heifers, brought \$9 to \$9.25, these prices being paid for cattle of different weights ranging from 800 to 1,100 lbs. The market was cleaned up early. Cattle receipts, 171. Average quality poor. The best lots brought \$10 and very thin calves down to \$6. Two good calves weighing together 420 pounds brought \$12.50. Sheep receipts, 13. Spring lambs quoted at \$12 to \$15 each. Good yearlings quoted at \$12.50 and sheep up to \$8.50. Hog receipts, 585. Selects of medium lightweights, \$16 and mixed lots, \$15.50 to \$15.75. Quotations: Off car weights, selects, \$16; sows, \$12.
