Free Holiday in Europe.

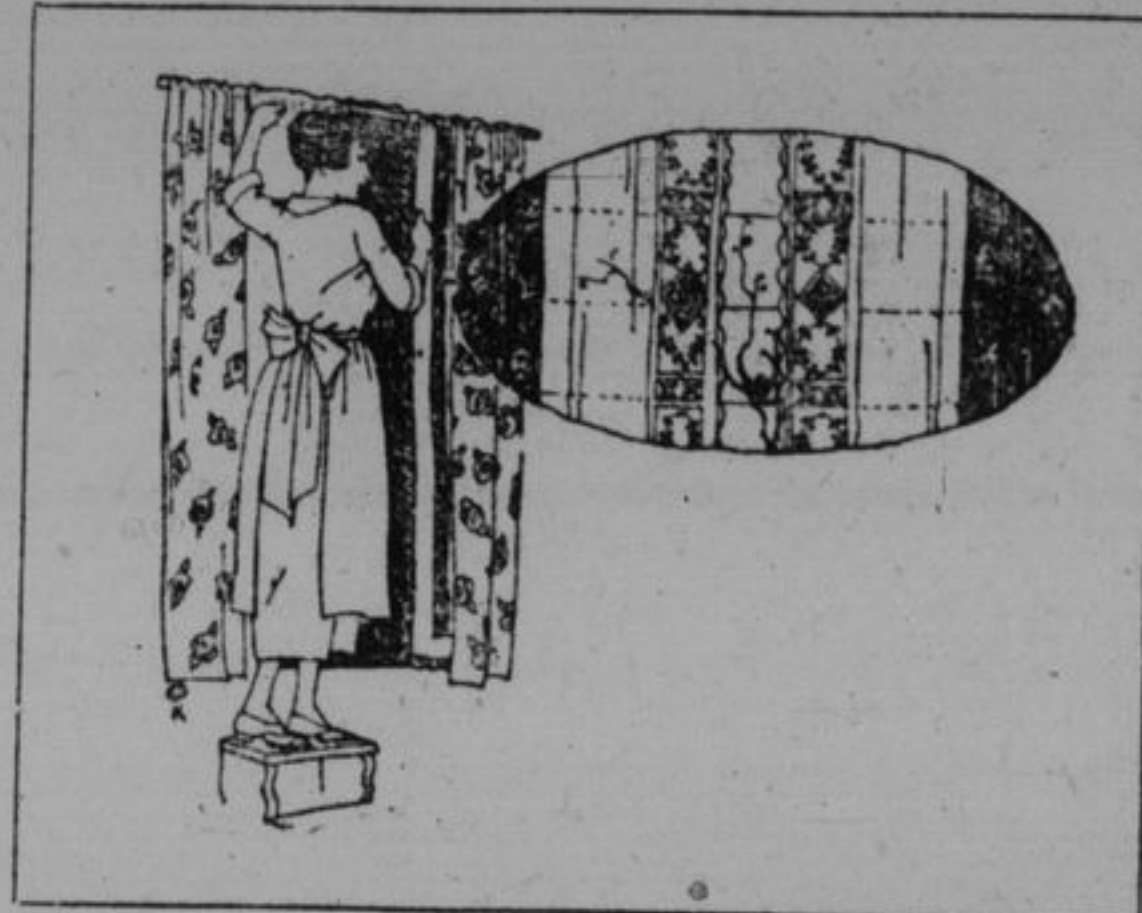
