How To Raise Calves.
A Whig reader at Brewer's Mills gives us the following valuable instructions to be followed in the raising of calves, as learned by experience and much success with stock: "For a number of reasons I have followed the same course with calves and among the important points requiring strict attention are first the diet. The mother milk is of course the best for the first two or three weeks. It pays to feed it to get the calf's digestive organs strong and healthy before starting on calf meal, but when the meal feeding is begun after making the feed according to the directions for calf meal, make it thin enough with warm water for the calf to drink it nicely with what milk can be given each day, to each calf. Feed sparingly so that the calves will always be eagerly waiting for the next meal. If trouble comes, if the calf does not drink readily, or has

diarrhoea or constipation, a purgative of from one to four ounces castor oil, or even salts may be used, doses of one or two tablespoonfuls according to age and size. When the bowels are restored to regularity, the calf quickly regains its appetite and careful feeding may be resumed. It is necessary to keep young calves warm and dry and as free from vermin as possible."

Frontenac Cheese Board.
The Frontenac cheese board will open for the season on the last Thursday in April. William Pillar, secretary-treasurer, expects that the opening price will be high. Many of the factories are being put into condition, but it will be May before all of them have any considerable quantity for sale. This will be the case with the factories on Howe Island, Wolfe Island and Amherst Island, all of which ship by the steamer Britannic, to Montreal, in order to save the cost of transhipment to refrigerator cars. There is an unusually early flow of milk this year, and all indications point to an early spring, which will lengthen the period of high production, and, consequently, increased profits for the dairy farmers.
