**Leaving For Chicago.**  
Thomas McKay, University  
avenue, well known in sporting circles  
of the city, leaves at the beginning  
of next week for Chicago, where he  
will enter the pay office of the Mar-  
shall Field Company.

**Harbor Water is Higher.**  
Harbor Master William McCam-  
mon reports that the water in the  
harbor this year is six inches higher  
than last year. Some of the boat  
houses, which were high and dry  
last year, have water in them this  
year.

**Plan Has Seven Supporters.**  
Interest centres around the Belle-  
ville council committee's proposal to  
pay themselves \$3 for every council  
meeting and every committee meet-

ing. It is claimed by those favoring  
the proposal that the recommenda-  
tion will carry with seven votes in its  
favor. At least two will oppose.

**Was Heavily Fined.**  
At Smith's Falls last evening Mag-  
istrate Sparham imposed a fine of  
\$400 on G. Gilligan, of Smith's  
Falls, who pleaded guilty to exposing  
or keeping liquor for sale. Of-  
ficers of the O.T.A. enforcement  
seized 95 bottles of gin.

**Tax Rate Takes A Jump.**  
At the meeting of the Smith's  
Falls council, on Monday, the tax  
rate was struck. It is to be forty-one  
mills. Last year it was 32½ mills.  
The council of 1920 left its successor  
with a deficit of \$23,000 to take care  
of, while the Board of Education,  
through not handing in adequate es-  
timates, was \$10,000 behind.

**Ready For Journey Homeward.**  
M. Saad, the popular dry goods  
merchant, of Napanee, will leave for  
New York, April 17th, and immedi-  
ately sail for Europe. He will land at  
Paris and thence go by rail to Mar-  
seilles from whence he will take a  
boat through the Mediterranean Sea,  
landing at Beirut, Syria, thence by  
rail to Damascus. Mr. Saad is going  
home to visit his parents, whom he  
has not seen in twelve years.

**Died From Paralysis.**  
The death occurred at her home in  
Bloomfield of Mrs. Lena Hicks, wife  
of Royal Hicks, as the result of a  
stroke of paralysis. The burial was  
made at Mountain View. Besides her  
father, James Boyd, of Wellington,  
who is eighty-six years of age, she  
leaves three sisters, Mrs. McPaul,  
Wellington; Mrs. R. Colling, Belle-  
ville; Mrs. Nelson Parliament, Amel-  
iasburgh, and one brother, Wesley  
Boyd, Allisville.

**Be Kind To Animals Week.**  
J. R. C. Dobbs, secretary of the  
Kingston Humane Society, is calling  
the attention of the public to the  
general observance of "Be-Kind-To-  
Animals Week," April 11th-16th.  
Notices are being sent from his office  
to all of the city clergy, school teach-  
ers and young people's organizations  
explaining the object of the campaign  
now being conducted all over Can-

ada by the humane societies with a  
view to impressing upon boys and  
girls, and the public as well, the duty  
of showing kindly consideration in  
the treatment of all dumb animals  
and birds.

**Rideau Canal Opening.**  
Navigation will be opened on the  
Rideau Canal this year from May  
1st it was announced by the Rideau  
Canal Commission. This is the  
usual date of opening, but, unlike  
most seasons, little difficulty this  
year is being experienced in getting  
the canal into shape, owing to the  
mild winter. The commission is ex-  
pecting that shipping activity will be  
resumed on a scale almost, if not  
quite, equal to last year.

**Superintendent Superannuated.**  
After thirty-two years service with  
the London Life Insurance Co., John  
Taylor, Brockville, has been super-  
annuated, and is succeeded as super-  
intendent by F. E. Miranda, Ganano-  
que, who has been employed by the  
company for the past six years. Mr.  
Taylor was employed in the Kingston  
office of the London Life for eleven  
years before being made superin-  
tendent at Brockville twenty-one  
years ago.

**Leading Resident Dead.**  
H. W. Perrett, Pembroke, one of  
the most prominent men of the dis-  
trict, and until a year ago local regis-  
trar and clerk of the surrogate and  
county court for Renfrew county,  
died at his home on Wednesday, in  
his seventy-ninth year. He had been  
a life-long Conservative in politics,  
and for a time was secretary of the  
North Renfrew Conservative Associa-  
tion. He was a Methodist in relig-  
ion, and in his younger days was ac-  
tive in the Odd Fellows order. He  
is survived by his wife and one son,  
Col. Thomas Perrett, in Regina, and  
one daughter, Mrs. E. T. White, Lon-  
don, Ont.

**Three Cadet Corps Camps.**  
Lt.-Col. Gillespie, O.C. cadet ser-  
vices, who is arranging for cadet  
camps in the summer, states that the  
reports received from outside points  
are very favorable and at the present  
time he does not see how one big dis-  
trict camp could be held owing to  
the great expense involved by trans-  
portation. In 1914, the second class  
rate charged by the railways was  
low and this item was not a heavy  
one, but to-day it is practically pro-  
hibitive, and the authorities are  
placed under the necessity of hold-  
ing local camps to avoid the trans-  
portation costs. These camps will  
be held at the Barrieffield ranges,  
Kingston, the Fair Grounds, Peter-  
boro, and Rockcliffe ranges, Ottawa,  
making three in all.

**ALL PHILADELPHIA  
HONORS WANAMAKER**  
Famous Merchant Began  
Career Sixty Years Ago  
This Month.

Philadelphia, April 7.—Elaborate  
plans are being made by the citizens  
of Philadelphia to honor John Wana-  
maker this month on the sixtieth an-  
niversary of his career as a mer-  
chant.  
It was on April 8th, 1861, that two  
young men, John Wanamaker and  
Nathan Brown, opened their little  
clothing store under the title of Oak  
Hall at the corner of Sixth and Mar-  
ket streets.  
From that small and unobstructive  
beginning sprang the career of one  
of the greatest merchants of the  
world, cabinet officer and philan-  
thropist.  
While the actual anniversary falls  
on Friday, the plan is to hold the  
celebration and luncheon April 26th,  
when prominent men from all parts  
of the country will be present, as  
well as a number of diplomats.

**First Woman Graduate  
Of Agricultural College**  
Guelph, April 7.—This year's  
graduating class at the O. A. C. in-  
cludes the first woman to graduate  
from the Ontario Agricultural Col-  
lege. Miss S. I. Chase, who finishes  
her course this year, comes from  
Greenwich, Nova Scotia, where her  
father owns a large fruit farm. Miss  
Chase took two years of her course  
at the Truro Agricultural College, N. S.

**Daylight Saving By-law Defeated.**  
Peterboro, April 8.—A by-law pro-  
viding for daylight saving in this city  
this summer was defeated here by a  
vote of 624 to 437. The sparsity of the  
electors was evidenced by the light-  
ness of the vote polled. A second by-  
law providing for the construction of  
storm drains near the Canadian Gen-  
eral Electric plant was also defeated,  
the vote being 519 to 254.

**Herrick Is Appointed Ambassador.**  
Washington, April 8.—Myron T.  
Herrick has decided to accept ap-  
pointment as United States Ambassa-  
dor to France, a post he filled under  
President Taft and which he occupied  
at the beginning of the war. Mr.  
Herrick's formal nomination will be  
made soon and he will go to France  
in the early summer.

**To Grant No Delay.**  
Quebec, April 7.—The government  
will grant no delay to the liquor  
dealers of the province in disposing  
of their stocks, Premier Taschereau  
stated yesterday. All liquor stocks  
must be disposed of or handed over  
to the control of the commission by  
May 1st, when the new law becomes  
effective.
