## PIGEONS SAVED AVIATORS.

**Bedraggled Homing Pigeon Carried Message Safely From North Sea.**

Somewhere on the northeast coast of England, night was approaching under a drizzly mist, and a raw wind whipped land and sea around the lonely group of buildings of a royal air force pigeon station. It was tea-time, and a welcome hour to the little group of bronzed men in British uniform who were chatting and laughing around the small fire in the messroom. One of them was telling a story of a Portuguese commander who had mistaken a gift of two baskets of British homing pigeons for an addition to the food supply, and who, in his letter of thanks to the British commander, had naively remarked that he and his staff had "enjoyed them very much indeed."

But the laugh which greeted his story was cut in two by a sound which caused every man in the room to pause and listen—it was the sharp insistent call of an electric bell which rings automatically when a homing pigeon enters the trap. A non-commissioned officer set down his cup of tea untasted, arose and opened the door leading to the pigeon loft. From a corner where it was huddled he lifted a light blue pigeon, very wet and bedraggled, skillfully removed a small aluminum cylinder from its right leg, slipped the bird into a pigeon basket, and carried it into the messroom.

"Ere!" he called, "set the blasted pigeon on the 'arth till it dries arf," and before the order could be obeyed he had drawn from the little cylinder a roll of tissue paper, smoothed it out flat, and was reading aloud:

"Machine wrecked and breaking up fifteen miles southeast of Rocky Point; send boat."

Two men had already reached for their oilskins and were passing out of the door into the fog. Another minute and those slipping their tea heard the staccato "put-put-put" of a motor boat chugging away in the general direction of Rocky Point.

Darkness had fallen on the North Sea, and four men, wet and chilled, still hung to a wrecked seaplane.

They had little hope that their message had been delivered, or, if it had, that help would come in time to save them. The wind had risen, and now and then the waves tore away some portion of the wreck, which sank lower and lower in the water. At last there came a sound—the sweetest music they had ever heard—the siren of a motor boat. Again and again it sounded, each time nearer; then the heartened men arose and sent up a wild shout in answer, and a hissing bow shot toward them from the darkness.

On top of a little basket by the fire in the messroom a modest blue pigeon sat quietly preening its damp feathers. And the next morning the British papers reported:

"Seaplane N-44 lost in the North Sea, fifteen miles southeast of Rocky Point. All the crew saved."

## Steering Vessels by Wireless.

Mist and fog will soon have no terrors for airmen. There should be no terrors now, said an official of the Air Ministry, as compasses have been so perfected that they adapt themselves immediately to their strange and trying position.

But even without compasses pilots will be able to make a bee-line for their objective. The other day a pilot and an observer started from the Biggin Hill airfield in a "bus" fitted with wireless telephony. They had, if possible, to pick up a destroyer at some unknown point off the south coast of England, the destroyer also using wireless. Steering purely by wireless, the airplane went in an absolutely straight line in the direction of the destroyer, which was some twenty miles off Brighton.

How is the manner of steering worked? By taking angle bearings, the method used in locating German submarines during the war. By noting the direction of their wireless messages to different points, our wireless experts were able to find the exact position of the submarines.

The wireless methods which proved so effective in war will soon be used to steer our seaplanes from their new port near Sheerness, or from the Thames between Westminster and Battersea, to different points of Europe. When the International Air Convention comes into effect the trails will also be blazed by means of code signals. Already the names of towns figure in great capitals on the roofs of railway stations in Kent and Sussex.

## Mr. Balfour.

Mr. Balfour is a Scottish philosopher who by chance of circumstances became a statesman. To many he is an enigma. "What a riddle!" a French writer exclaimed after a study of his character and temperament. In his new book, "Mr. Balfour," Mr. F. T. Raymond says: "Five hundred years hence it will probably not matter very much in history that Mr. Balfour was Prime Minister of Britain, but as long as the proper study of mankind is man he will be something of a puzzle to all who take interest in human personality." Mr. Balfour's mentality is largely that of the metaphysician and as such is probably best understood and appreciated by the Scottish mind.

## "Floating" Tower of London.

It is stated that the Tower of London moves four times daily, as the tides in the Thames ebb and flow. According to Mr. J. Landfear Lucas, the movement, which is most pronounced in the part nearest the river, made the place unsuitable for certain recent demonstrations under a Government Department. It seems that the movement is due to the fact that many tons of water penetrate under the foundation with the rising tides, and pass out with the receding tides. While the volume of water is under the building, and gradually increasing as the tide comes in, it has the effect of moving upwards the whole mass of the Tower.
