**Macdonnell Street Sewer.**  
The Macdonnell street sewer, whose construction was undertaken by the chief object of helping the unemployed, is not yet completed, and it will likely require the remainder of this month to finish the work of laying the sewer and water pipes.

**Dissatisfied With Wages.**  
There is a report in marine circles

that there is much dissatisfaction over the wages paid the men on the big boats this season. It is understood, however, that everything is satisfactory on all the local boats and that there will be no trouble along these lines.

**School Estimates Were Cut.**  
The civic finance committee cut \$2,900 off the estimates of the Board of Education, of which \$1,500 was taken from the public school requirements and \$500 from the collegiate institute. The Board of Education will not stand for any reduction on their maintenance estimates. The finance committee thought music and vocation schools could be cut off.

**Buys Farm For \$6,000.**  
Peter McCarthy has purchased the McGonigle farm near Newboro, and has already taken possession. The price paid was nearly \$6,000.

Thomas McCarty, Newboro, has rented Mrs. M. Mulville's farm at Westport and is busily engaged moving his household effects and farm stock to his new quarters. Mr. McCarty has rented his farm to A. Egan.

**Started Their Drives.**  
Ferguson & Findlay have started their spring drive which takes in the Madawaska River and its tributaries and it is expected that the work this year will last well into September. This company takes the timber only as far as Arnprior. Their working force will be divided into two gangs, fifty men in the first, handling what is technically known as the "jam", the logs, ties and other material that can be more easily driven, and about sixty men to take care of the rear.

**Death of an Aged Resident.**  
One of the oldest, if not the oldest, residents in Napanee, passed away at the Hotel Dieu, Kingston, on April 4th, in the person of George O'Hara, at the advanced age of eighty-nine years. Deceased was born in the province of Quebec. He came to Napanee with his parents at an early age, and resided there continuously till the time of his death. He was a kindly old gentleman. Deceased leaves surviving his daughter, Mrs. Silas Woodcock, and two sons, George, Syracuse, and James, Canastota, N.Y. William O'Hara, Napanee, is a brother of deceased.

**A Howe Island Event.**  
On March 30th a successful box social and dance was held at John

Pickett's, Howe Island, the house being taxed to its capacity. Violin selections were rendered by Clarence Quinn, Charles Garrah, and Gordon Turcotte, while Mrs. P. Quinn played the piano accompaniments. At 11.30 o'clock the boxes, all of which were tastefully decorated, were auctioned by H. Jackson, Pittsburg. The event was both a social and financial success, and the sum of fifty dollars was realized for the relief of Irish comrades in distress.

**Death of Anson Lowery.**  
Anson Lowery passed away at his home at Demorestville, Saturday, after a brief illness. The deceased was a son of George Lowery, and was born in South Marysburgh forty-seven years ago. About twenty years ago he and Ethel Dunning were married and for the last five years they have lived at Demorestville. Mr. Lowery was a very useful citizen. For two years he was assessor for the township of Sophiasburgh and had been one of the township auditors. For five years he was steward on the steamer North King when that steamer's popular route was between Rochester and the Thousand Islands.

**Through the Wreck**  
Clem Freeman, a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Freeman, Deseronto, was severely scalded on the right arm and leg when the crown sheet of a locomotive upon which he was employed as a fireman blew out twenty-five miles from Capreol on March 26th. Mr. Freeman, who escaped from death was nothing short of miraculous. He was blown from the cab, reached Deseronto on the C. N. R. passenger that bumped the rails east of Napanee on the morning of the 24th. The young man's friends will be pleased to learn that he is now rapidly recovering.

**Soldier Botanist.**  
During the occupation of Salonika by the allies a private in the 28th division, William B. Turrill, found opportunities to gather and dry wild flowers from Macedonia and to collect their seeds for Kew gardens, England. Being a member of the expert staff of the establishment, he had sufficient experience to carry out what must have been, in the circumstances, a fairly difficult enterprise. Macedonia has been very little explored botanically and Mr. Turrill's collections form an important addition to the knowledge of its flora. One of his discoveries was a Silene which was entirely new. No less than 60 packets of seeds he managed to collect. When it is remembered that some were secured when his unit was actually under fire it will be seen they testify in no small degree to his devotion.

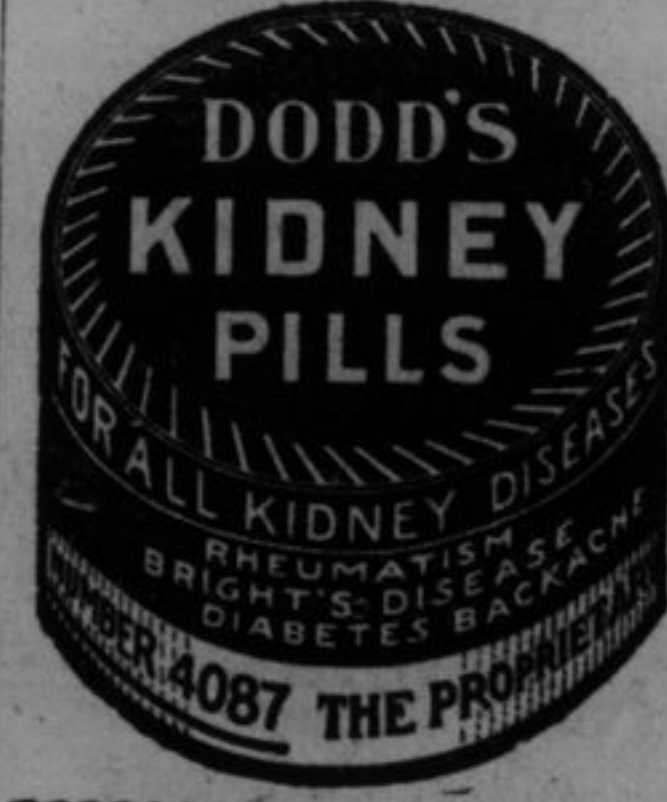
