The play was held up for some me, but finally Miss Anglin recovred sufficiently to go on, finishing he performance in great pain.



There were over eight hundred men present, representing all classes. The other speakers were Col. J. S. N. Leslie and Dr. L. J. Austin, professor of surgery, Queen's University, who dealt with the medical aspects of the liquor question from a scientific standpoint.

Charges Tyranny. The meeting was opened by Prof.

Cappon, who said that the object of the Citizens' Liberty League for Moderation was to secure a full and fair expression of public opinion upon the important question of prohibition. "We have never yet," said he, "got so full and satisfactory an expression that would warrant any government in proceeding with legislation, and this is our object. Why was it so difficult?
