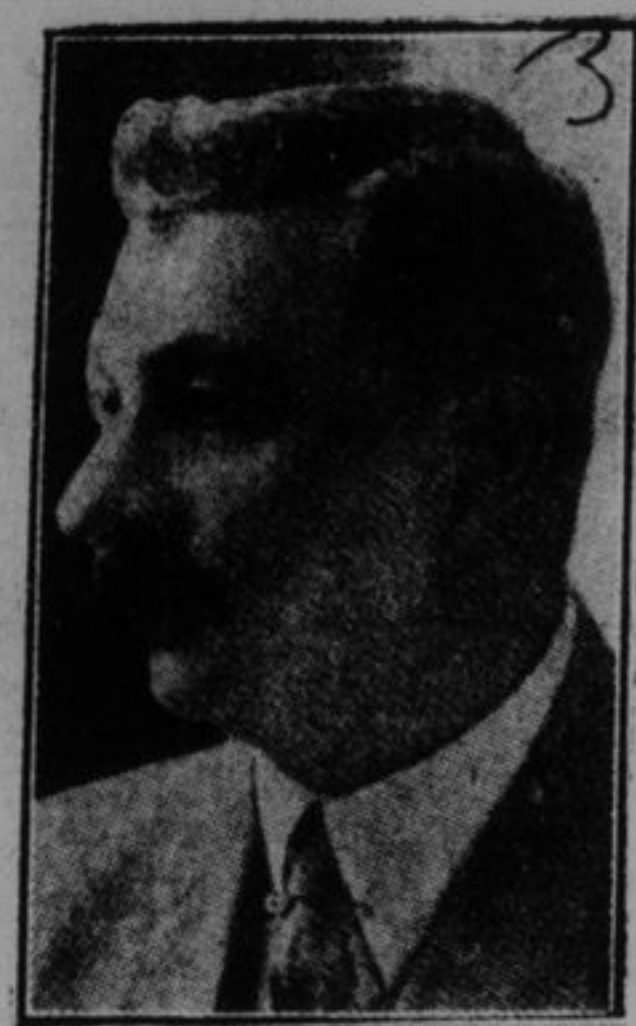

WETS HOLD BIG MEETING

Addresses Given By Prof. Cappon, Col. Leslie And Dr. Austin.

"Are we to live under a governmental tyranny hounded on by an ecclesiastical tyranny?" This was the question asked by Professor James Cappon in an address before a packed audience in Ontario Hall at the smoker and concert held on Saturday night under the auspices of the Citizens' Liberty League for Moderation.

Professor Cappon received hearty applause at periods throughout his address. There was the utmost good order as distinguished by the graceful scenes in the Grand Opera House on Friday night.

Charges Tyranny.

The meeting was opened by Prof. Cappon, who said that the object of the Citizens' Liberty League for Moderation was to secure a full and fair expression of public opinion upon the important question of prohibition.
