"QUEEN ZEPHRA" AT GRAND

The First Performance on Thursday Evening Was a Great Success.

Splendid scenery, gorgeous electrical effects, rich and beautiful costumes, in tones of yellow and violet, songs and choruses, dances, drills, all put on with brightness and pep, made the performance of "Queen Zephra" at the Grand Opera House, on Thursday evening, under the auspices of Annandale Chapter, I.O.G.E., one of the best amateur performances ever seen in Kingston, and Mr. and Mrs. Drake, who have, in three weeks produced this result are to be congratulated. Thursday night was the first full performance on the stage of the Opera House, so a few amusing incidents occurred, most sympathetically received by the large audience, who thoroughly enjoyed the programme. The curtain rose on the court yard of Zephra Palace, with Sir Thoris (Joseph Jeffries), and a chorus of Normandy peasants in yellow and violet costumes, who did good service throughout the play. Princess Neyera, with many jewels (Miss Phyllis Devlin), arrives with her attendant, Flora (Mrs. R. G. Andrews) and the princess sings a charming song, calling cupid to tell her what love is, and the daintiest cupid (Miss Dora Rees), responds to her call holding her kart out, the light falling on her shimmering wings. Prince Juma (R. Preston), in a handsome costume of violet velvet and a plumed hat, sang delightfully, as did Sir Solon (Capt. Lee). In the next scene, Queen Zephra (Miss Cecil Macnee), in gorgeous robes, glittering with jewels, enters, preceded by a tiny velvet clad herald (Alfred Fair), and then King Decius (C. B. S. Harvey) wearing a magnificent court costume, comes on, and sings exceptionally well, "I am the King." A duel between King Decius and Prince Juma, who, in spite of an ancient feud, would marry his daughter, Princess Neyera, gives a bit of action, both Mr. Harvey and Mr. Preston filling their parts cleverly. The Queen is displaced at the violence and called for a review of her troops, and the Red Hussars enter in their striking orange and black costumes and drill as hussars should, calling forth great applause. By a clever arrangement of the scenery the Fairy Godmother (Miss Helen Nicol) appears and gives a talisman to a tiny page to take to the Queen, who gives her decree that Prince Juma shall marry the Princess Neyera, much to her father's, King Decius' disgust. The carnival, where the Queen and her court sit aloft, and the dancers come on, provided a treat indeed. Solos by Elaine (Mrs. Drake), Flora (Mrs. R. G. Andrews), the review of the Red Hussars, the charming dance of the flowers, the tennis dance, the unique black birds in their striking costumes, the comedores with a solo by their leader, Miss Doris Browne, the very delightful Garland girls with Miss Margaret as a graceful solo dancer, the Graces, a lovely dance, five young girls in white with the flags of the Allies for wings, the Union Jack in the centre; the exceedingly graceful castaret dance. A much applauded number was the news boys, who sang with great spirit and with as much energy scrambled for the coppers thrown on the stage. A pretty contrast dance, the minut of 1821 and the fox trot of 1921. "Every Little White" by Marguerite (Miss Myrtle King), Olga (Miss Ardelie Elder), Cecile (Miss Louise Polley), was much applauded. Miss Francesca Foulkes dances most beautifully, a ballet dance, and was loudly applauded, but was unable to respond to her encore. The curtain rose for the last act upon a splendid pageant with one hundred and sixty people upon the stage, most beautifully grouped. The Fairy Godmother reappears, King Decius consents to Princess Neyera's marriage to Prince Juma, Cupid triumphs and God Save The King is sung.

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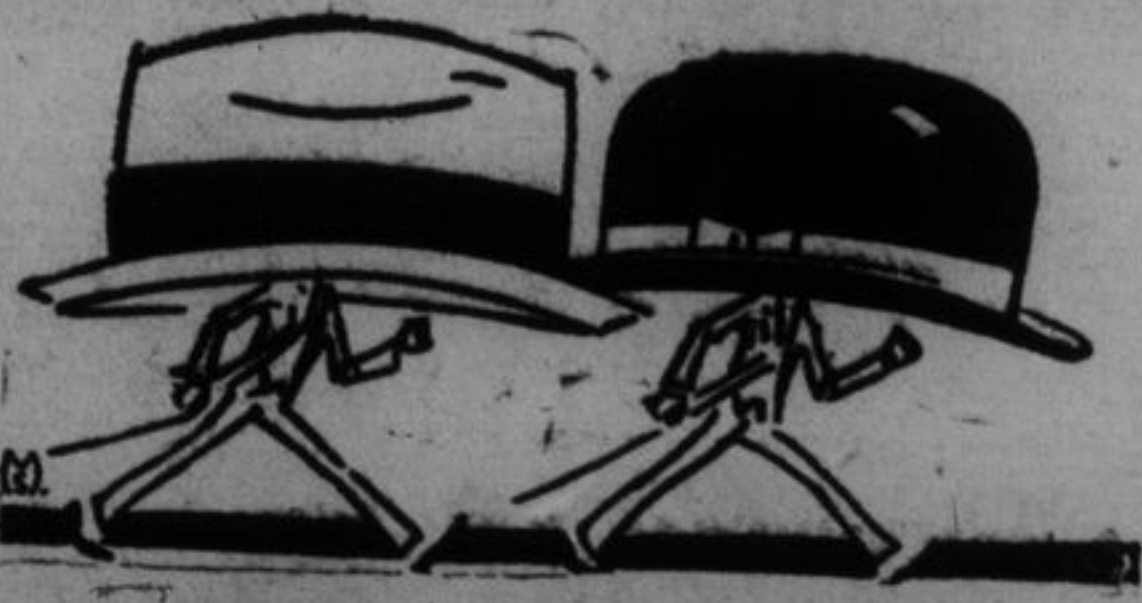
