Langemarck Day.
Plans are being prepared for the fitting observance of Langemarck Day, April 21st, and it is likely that all of the garrison troops, R.M.C. cadets, the militia units and high school cadets will take part in a parade to the cricket field, where a review will be held by Brig-Gen. W. B. King, C.M.G., D.S.O., general officer commanding M.D. No. 3. The naval cadets, with bugle band, will be prominent in the parade, and the veteran bodies of Kingston will have strong representation present.

Face Badly Injured.
Roy Moore, an employee at the Gibbard furniture factory, Nanawau, was the victim of a painful accident. He was engaged in putting a belt on a planer which he had been operating, when the swiftly revolving belt broke and struck him in the face. The left side of his face and forehead was badly lacerated and the eye was also injured. Street Railway Service.
The Street Railway which has been giving a ten minute service during the winter the same as it had been giving during the summer, came out quite successfully in its experiment and cleared expenses and a little over. The company has had several winters without serious expenditures for snow cleaning and this has been a fine asset to the line. It is said that there are prospects during the coming summer to put on a six or eight minute service and if this is done it is thought it will meet with popular favor.

A wedding of much interest to many Ottawa people took place recently at Peoria, Ill., when Miss Ruth Cooper, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. F. Cooper, was married to Dr. Rupert Stevens, of Ottawa. Dr. E. L. Bruce, Kingston, was Dr. Stevens' best man. Dr. Stevens was graduated in arts and medicine from Queen's University, where he had a distinguished record, and did two years post graduate work in New York and Brooklyn hospitals. He served three years in the war with the Canadian Army Medical Corps. He is now practising in Ottawa.

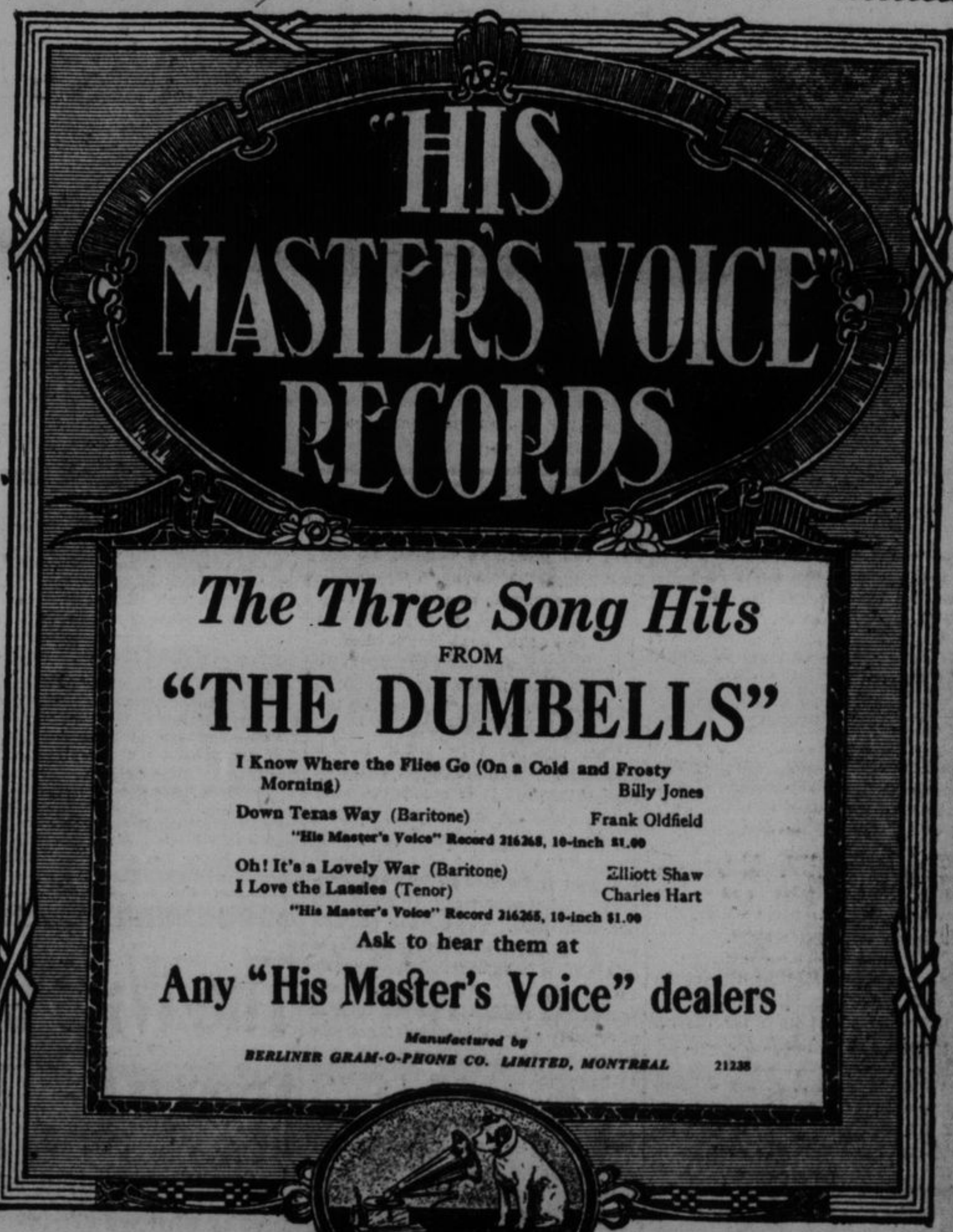
USE SUNKIST SEEDLESS RAISINS FOR COOKING
