BIG PROHIBITION RALLY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

Was Held in the Allen Theatre on Sunday After-noon.

The publicity campaign on behalf of prohibition closed with the mass meeting held in the Allen theatre on Sunday afternoon, although the church pulpits were utilized to the fullest extent by a number of the city denominations at both the morning and evening services. The chief centre of attraction, however, was the Allen theatre, and it was taxed to capacity, the audience numbering over 1,300 persons, mostly men. Addresses were given by John A. Patterson, K.C., Toronto; Dr. R. Bruce Taylor, Principal of Queen's University; Dr. Jas. Miller, pathologist at Queen's, and Canon W. F. Fitzgerald, Mayor Nickle presided.

Prof. Miller was the first speaker. He did not know anything about the O.T.A., he said, except that it made the medical man a bartender. He knew nothing about the referendum, but he did not agree with Dr. Austin respecting the use of alcohol. He thought it was a proto-plasmic poison. As a stimulant it was merely an irritant, such as smelling salts, and when the irritation wore off it became a narcotic poison and reduced vitality. The progeny of the drinker was inferior to that of the abstainer, and the duration of life among abstainers was longer than among the users of liquor. The liquor interests were a malignant power in Britain, Dr. Miller said.

Dr. Taylor gave an enlightening and entertaining address. He said that the liquor laws were being made a tool of in Ontario today, and the O.T.A. was degrading the medical profession. He gave a sketch of liquor legislation, answered some of the arguments of the Citizens' Liberty League and declared that he would vote "Yes" on Monday.

Mr. Patterson declared that if it was wrong to have liquor in the public bars, that had been wiped out, it was also wrong to have it in the cellars, and the prohibition people would not rest until they have the private cellars cleaned out.

Canon W. F. Fitzgerald gave a most eloquent address. He had been asked to speak only an hour before the meeting. The attitude of the Anglican church was purely spiritual. "Self-control" best expressed her motto on social questions, but, as for himself, he would vote "Yes" for prohibition, because he would not put his hand to anything that might prove a stumbling block to any person.

Three lawyers inspected the Portmouth penitentiary on Friday afternoon. They were W. F. Nickle, K.C., chairman, Francis King, government counsel, and T. J. Rigney, defence. The business of these gentlemen is the investigation of the female department, and incidentally, the complaints of two guards, placed under suspension of some months ago. When interviewed W. F. Nickle stated that the taking of evidence would not begin until next week and the visit was but preliminary as his associates desired to make a survey of the interior of the premises.

Exercise Their Conscience. In St. Mary's cathedral on Sunday morning, Rev. Father McCann, who was the preacher, referred briefly to the prohibition campaign and told his hearers that in their answers to the questions on the ballot they should exercise their own individual conscience. They were not to be exposed to intimidation or coercion, but should be guided by their personal experience and belief. Self-control in all things was essential to good citizenship, Father McCann declared.

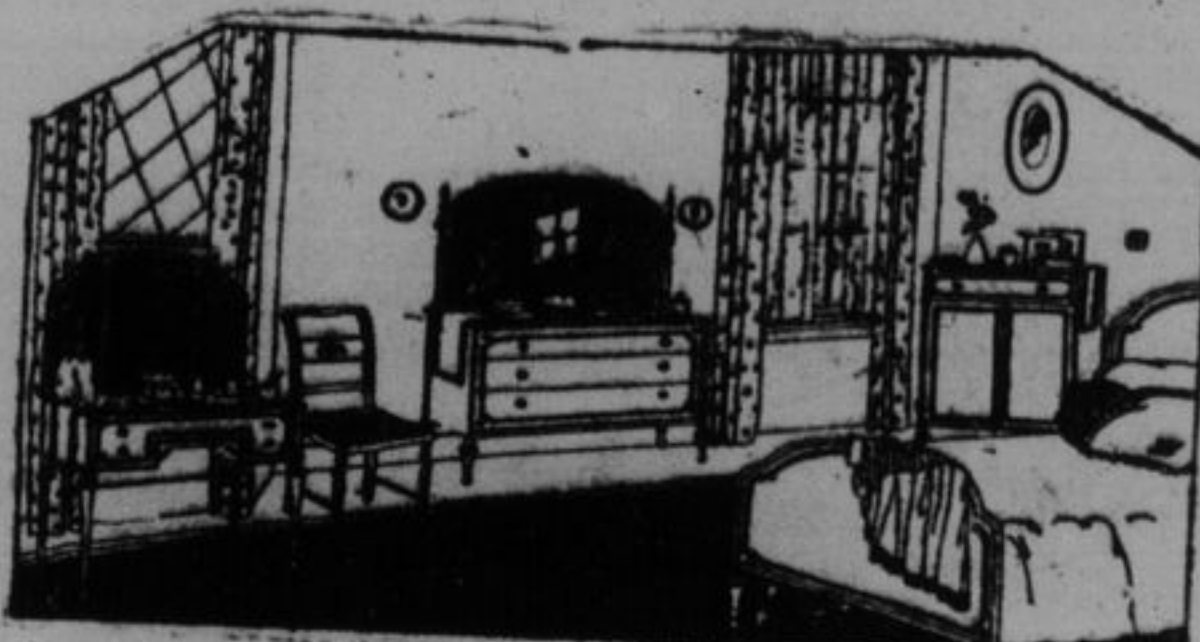

THE PRICE OF BREAD CANNOT BE REDUCED

To Pre-war Prices Until Flour Takes a Very Heavy Drop.

"The price of flour must go down much lower before we will reach 1914 prices for bread." This was the statement of a local manufacturer of bread to the Whig when interviewed regarding the statement that the price of flour had dropped two dollars a barrel during the past two weeks. Flour in 1914 was selling at \$4 a barrel and it is now at \$10 a barrel. It was over \$15 at one time and the price of bread soared to twenty-eight cents for the large loaf. It has now gone down to twenty-one cents retail and twenty cents wholesale. Asked if there was likely to be an immediate drop to the consumers, local dealers said that the matter had not been considered, but if there was a substantial reduction in the price of flour the price of bread would be reduced.

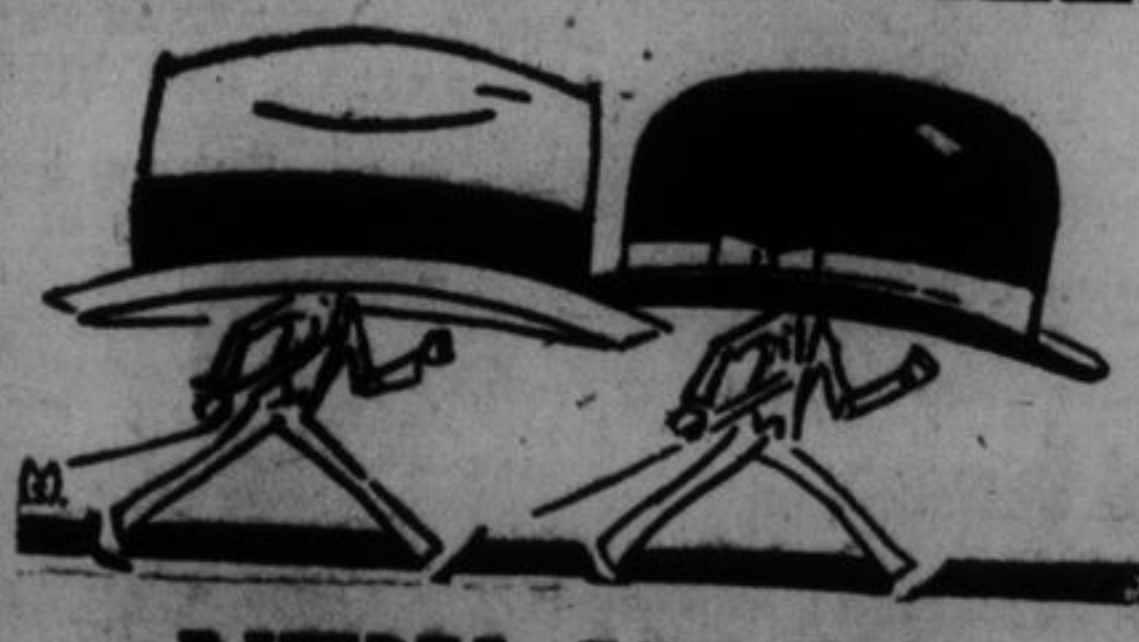
