The Whig should be congratulated for using its influence in keeping Mr. Spracklin out of the city. It seemed so strange that a member of a Christian church should wish to have him and say the hall would be filled. Doubtless it would. But it would have been pandemonium intensified, judging by Mr. Johnson's reception. There is hardly a family under Heaven who has not been caused trouble and sorrow in some way by the use of strong drink with one or more of its members. Yet they do not believe in the methods that are being followed to stamp out the curse of intemperance. The Good Book tells us to be temperate in all things. GAP WILL BE CLOSED UP

Kehoe Bros., of Pembroke, Buy More Vacant Land.

A real estate deal of considerable importance was concluded in Pembroke on Tuesday, whereby Kehoe Bros. became the owners of that part of main street frontage known as the Thibodeau property. It comprises about forty-five feet frontage on the north side of Pembroke street on which before the fire of 1913 stood the building occupied by Beal & Taylor, Jewellers, and A. Primeau, barber. Messrs. Kehoe Bros. some time ago purchased the Grieve property adjoining this, with a frontage of twenty-two feet, so that they now have a total of sixty-six feet, on which they will build this season.

Bernard Leacy on Monday started work on the erection of a store building adjoining the store of Messrs. Bernard Leacy & Co. Ltd., and a large number of bricklayers are now rushing up the walls on the foundation, which was made ready last fall. This has a frontage of thirty-two feet, and will provide two stores, with apartments overhead. William Leacy some time ago announced that if building was proceeded with on the other properties, he would also build on the vacant lot between Messrs. Leacy & Shields' and the Grieve property, so that with all three owners undertaking to build this year the bad gap which has existed on that section of main street since the fire of 1913 will be closed up and that section of one of the streets best business areas will again be occupied.

CLAIMS THE DEFEAT WAS ACCIDENTAL

Premier of Australia Maintains That It Does Not Involve Resignation.

London, April 18.—According to Australian cables the defeat sustained by the Hughes government in the commonwealth parliament Friday was purely accidental, and does not mean necessarily that the government is under obligation to resign.

The position of the Hughes government is a very delicate one, as it depends on the speaker's vote to maintain its majority. Recently three of the members threatened to secede to the country party or opposition, which would have forced the resignation of Mr. Hughes' government, but after negotiating they consented to vote with the administration, while Mr. Hughes was in London attending the imperial conference. Strong opposition has developed among the element who constitute the government party, against what they style as Mr. Hughes' autocratic methods, his neglect of parliament and his personal dictatorship over the cabinet.

Dr. Lawson Answers Mr. Forster.

Verona, April 18.—(To the editor): Mr. Forster charges me with "championing the modern Pharisee; he calls my letter "scurrilous," and my "poetry of a very poor quality and not worthy of a reply." Then why did he reply? According to his own statement he was doing an unworthy thing. All who have read his letters and mine will see for themselves which is "scurrilous." He charges "some prohibition preachers" with "abusing their opponents," showing "very bad taste," "forgetting the ninth commandment "at best a poor imitation of Billy Sunday," "making use of billingsgate and buffoonery," calls them "Pharisees," etc. And that is the man who calls my letters a "scurrilous championing of the modern Pharisee!" He should remember that his letter was unprovoked, while mine was necessitated by his unjust accusations.

No, I did not "champion the modern Pharisee," Rev. J. W. 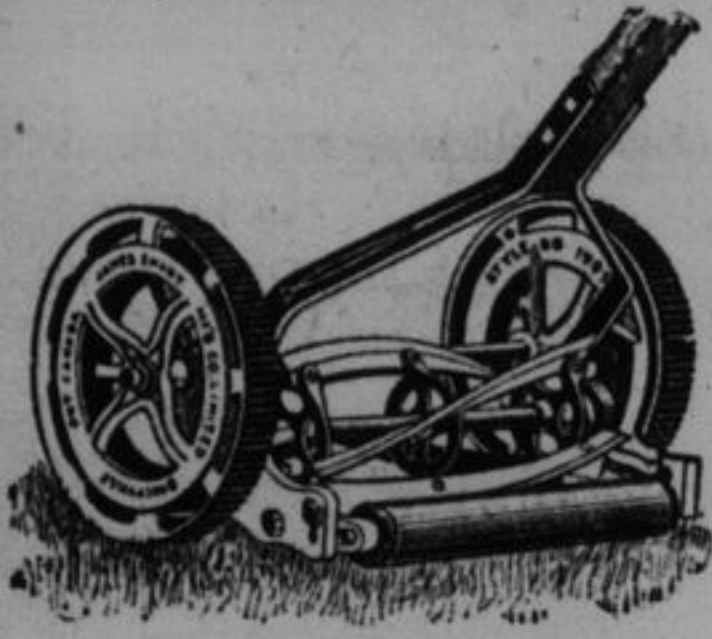
