 Bill complains that business is not half as good as it was when it was twice as good as it is. Jim congratulates himself that business is twice as good as it was when it was only half as good as it is.
 These two men living in the same town and under the same natural conditions see things differently, and the one is always happy and the other always miserable. The difference lies back of their eyes, not in front of them.

Can Pay Controllers \$5,000 a Year.
 Toronto, April 15.—The Legislature's committee on municipal law to-day endorsed the bill by which Toronto may pay its controllers as high as \$5,000 per annum—with the consent of the electors. At present they get \$2,500 per annum.

A "HYDRO" RECORD IN MAKING ESTIMATES

 Any municipality doing business with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario undertakes to buy its electrical energy exclusively from the Commission, and to pay a rate per horse-power per annum sufficient to cover the cost of it to the Commission.
 If, at the end of the year, the sum of the power-payments exceeds the cost of generation and delivery, this "Operating Surplus" is held by the Commission to the credit of the municipality, and interest is allowed upon it. Should the revenue be less than the actual cost of supplying the power, the "Operating Shortage" is charged to the municipality in a thirteenth monthly power bill. The wholesale rate for the following year is adjusted so that the surplus or shortage may be reduced to a minimum.
 In many municipalities the growth of business has been so extraordinary as to exceed for a succession of years the expectation of the Commission. In such cases large Operating Surpluses have been accumulated. Beachville has paid up a reserve on this account alone equal to half the value of the local plant. Galt has nearly \$30,000; Guelph, about \$26,000; Kitchener, about \$28,000; and New Toronto, over \$28,000—more than half the value of the local plant.
 Similarly, a number of municipalities have had shortages while the rates were being adjusted. The difference between the sum of the Operating Surpluses and the Operating Shortages for the period 1912-1919 was \$283,479.93. In the same eight years the Hydro-Electric System sold to the co-operating municipalities more than 1,000,000 horse-power of energy, representing roughly about \$20,000,000.
 Therefore the percentage of error in calculating the probable revenue of the local systems for the period and fixing the wholesale power-rates to the municipalities has been about 1.4. That interesting fact alone is a proof of the ability and experience of the engineering staff of the Commission.
 In eight years of operation, the associated municipalities paid on an average only about 28c. per horse-power more than the actual cost of delivering the energy at the municipal boundaries (less than 4c. per year) and that 28 cents is held by the Commission to the credit of the municipalities, interest being allowed upon it.
 Here is a record in estimating that will take some beating, especially considering the fact that the period reviewed covered the abnormal conditions of war and reconstruction.
