MONTREAL HEIRESS ESCAPES CONVENT Court Permits Her to Wed Despite Opposition of Relations.

Montreal, April 18.—In a case heard and decided before the Superior Court here, Saturday, a girl of seventeen, an orphan and heiress to \$30,000, who demanded marriage with a man exactly double her age, against the wishes of a council of her family, who desired to place her in a convent, won her wish, and the court was the scene of the solemn act of signature by bride and "bridegroom" of a marriage contract duly witnessed in turn by a notary and Judge Loranger of the Superior Court.

Brockville, April 18.—In the interest of economy the Grand Trunk has abolished the office of trainmaster here, and the occupant, George Cooper, has been transferred to Island Pond, Vt., to act in the same capacity. The positions of passenger trainmaster, eastern lines, held by Robert Marks, and of night chief despatcher at Belleville, held by Thomas Cushing, have also been abolished. Further changes, it is said, are contemplated shortly.

The Storm The worst sleet storm experienced locally for some years, occurred on Saturday afternoon and night. As a result all of our long distance lines and several rural party lines west of Kingston are out of order. Between Kingston and Napanee sixty poles and wires were blown down. Some of the poles were broken off and others pulled out of the ground. Seventeen poles and wires on our Long Distance lead to Seeley's Bay were blown down. Several long distance and rural lines running in other districts were also put out of order by the storm. Saturday night our local construction gang were instructed to report for duty on Sunday morning. Trucks and cars were used in patrolling the districts to ascertain the extent of the damage. The highways were cleared for traffic. Most of the city phones that were put out of order by the storm were again in service by Sunday night. A carload of "Emergency Cable," which will be used to bridge the breaks, was shipped by Express from Montreal on Sunday. Three experienced construction gangs were sent in from outside points and are now at work with the local staff. It will take several weeks to repair the damage but with the use of the Emergency Cable it is expected that several of the lines will again be in service by to-night. The Bell Telephone Co. of Canada
