## HOME FOR AGED UNDER REVIEW

### Albert Clay Charges Mismanagement—Superintendent Ready to Meet Them.

Albert Clay, 37 Johnson street, complains that there has been mismanagement in the treatment of inmates at the Home for the Aged. Mr. Clay is a former cook at this institution.

The board of directors of this institution met on Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock to hear charges Mr. Clay has to make, but as Mr. Clay did not put in an appearance at the meeting the investigation had to be adjourned. A resolution was passed fixing the date for the hearing of the charges some time between April 25th and April 29th.

Mayor Nickle presided at the meeting, and the other members of the board of directors present were Ald. Couper, Dr. W. W. Sands, city clerk; Mrs. W. G. Jordan and Mrs. Strange. When the meeting opened Dr. Sands read a letter which had been written under date of March 15th by Mr. Clay, addressed to Mayor Nickle and members of the city council. The letter read as follows:

"I wish to complain of the mismanagement of the local Home for the Aged. Treatment of patients is of such a character that should in my estimation be immediately investigated by your body, so that further abuse may be prevented, and public scandal avoided. I should be pleased to appear before proper investigation committee and furnish all evidence in my statement."

The statement, giving the nature of the complaints of Mr. Clay, was not read at the meeting, owing to the fact that Mr. Clay was not present.

The members were ready to go into any evidence that might be given by Mr. Clay and invite a thorough investigation. On motion of Ald. Couper, it was agreed that a date be fixed for the investigation between April 25th and April 29th. It was also agreed to hold the investigation in the city buildings, and Mr. Clay will have the opportunity of having any witnesses he might care to have summoned from the Home called.

Letter from Mr. Clay  
The following letter under date of April 18th was received by Mayor Nickle from Mr. Clay:

"I beg to advise you that through the legal representative being out of town, who was to accompany me at the meeting of the board of directors for the Home for the Aged in connection with the investigation, I beg respectfully to advise that I will not be present. I think in view of this, the meeting should be postponed."

The city solicitor will be asked to attend the investigation on behalf of the city, and Mr. Baldwin, the superintendent of the Home, who was present at Monday's meeting, and ready to meet any charges that might be made against the management of the institution, will be given the privilege of being represented by counsel.

In view of the reports circulated alleging mismanagement at the home the members of the board of directors are very anxious to have a thorough investigation, while Mr. Baldwin, the superintendent, is just as anxious to have the matter taken up.

### COURSE IN JOURNALISM

Four Lecturers to Conduct Special Course.

Whitwell Wilson, a former North of England newspaperman, now acting as New York correspondent for several old country papers, and attached to the school of journalism at Columbia University, has been asked to deliver the lectures on editorial writing and news-gathering.

## SIR JOSEPH FLAVELLE MAY HEAD THE C.N.R.

Particularly as Regards the Financial End—Advising Government Counsel.

Ottawa, April 19.—The presence in Ottawa of Sir Joseph Flavelle in conference with the counsel who are advising the government in respect to the Grand Trunk situation, lends color to the report that in the projected reconstruction of the management of the National Railways, he may become head of the system, particularly as regards the financial end. It is understood that Sir Joseph's services have been sought in that regard, but the first intimation was that he was unlikely to accept. He has been here for several conferences.

## ALL CLASSES SHOULD TAKE THEIR SHARE

In Loss in Values in Bringing Prices to Low Levels.

Washington, April 19.—Legislation to eliminate unnecessary brokering transactions, to facilitate the wide distribution of information regarding market conditions, and to strengthen the powers of the federal government in its price investigations, is recommended by the federal trade commission in a report on the general industrial situation, drawn up at the request of President Harding and made public at the White House.

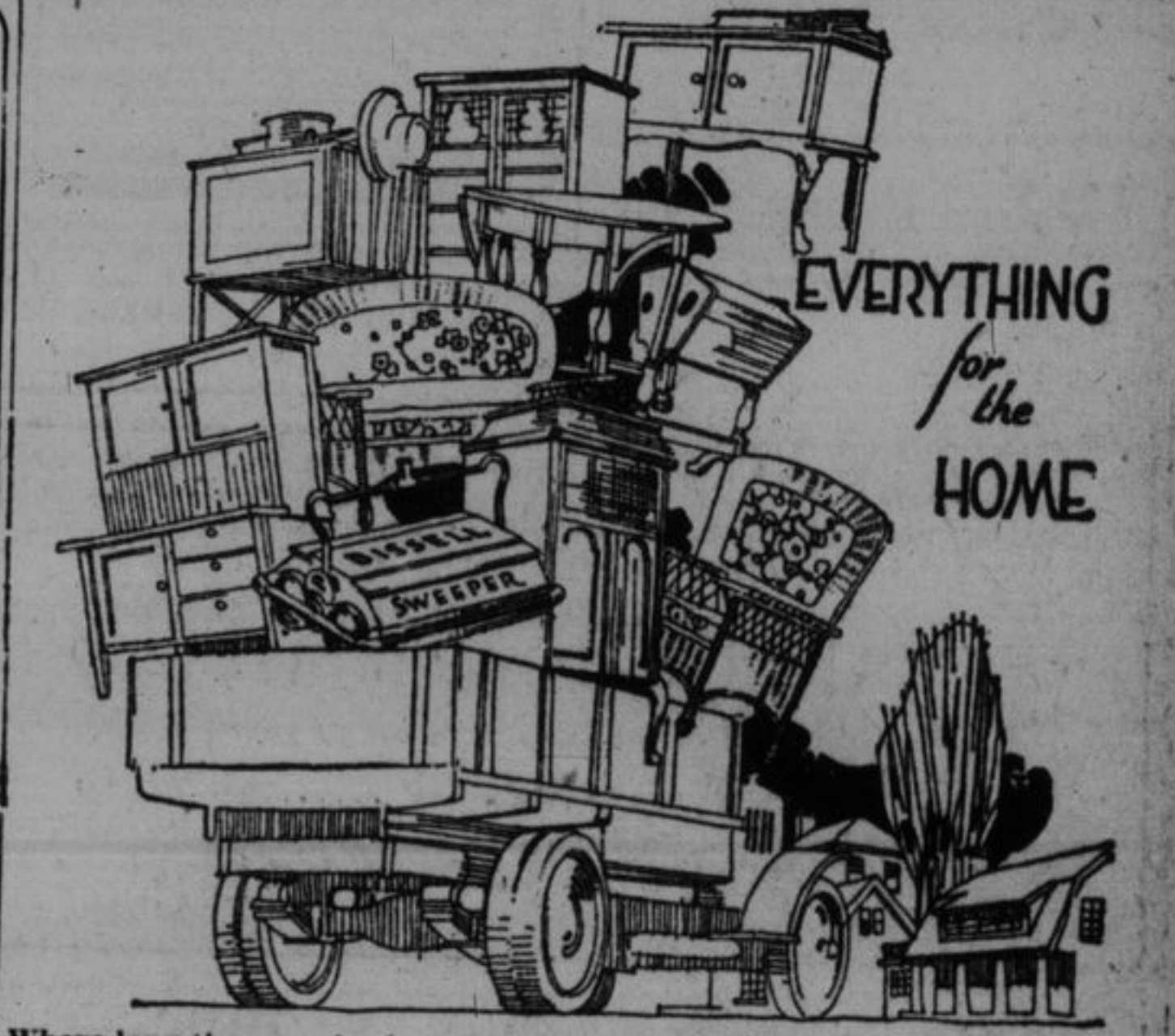
