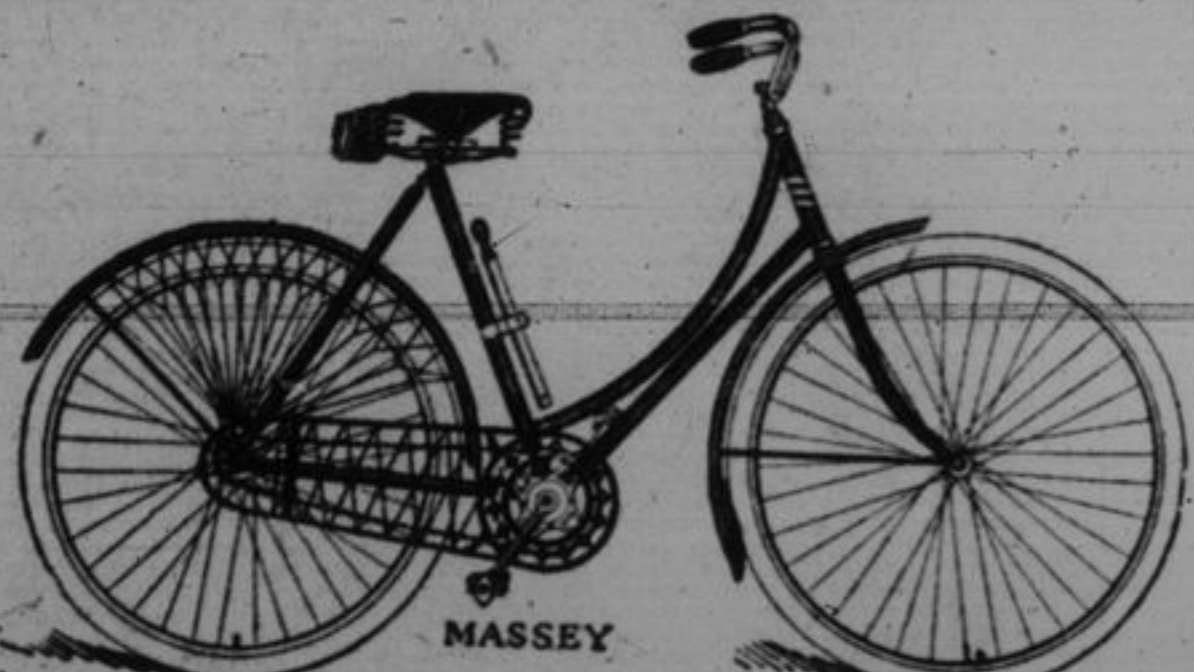

SUNDAY BASEBALL IS LEGAL IN MARYLAND

The Maryland blue laws, so far as they apply to Sunday baseball, received a polar pleas punch which left them "hors-de-combat" when a jury in the criminal code rendered a verdict acquitting Jack Dunn, manager of the Baltimore International League team, who was tried under an indictment based upon the fact that Sunday games have been played at Oriole Park.

When the foreman of the jury announced "not guilty" as the verdict the large crowd in the court room at Baltimore started a demonstration which was quickly silenced by Judge Duffy.

A crowd surrounded Dunn and his counsel and showered them with congratulations. As the jurors left the room after being discharged they received good-natured slaps on the back and exclamations of "good man," "atta boy" and other compliments followed them until they reached the door to the corridor.

The same law under which Dunn was indicted provided for the death penalty for those convicted of "blasphemy," according to Joseph N. Ullman, counsel for Dunn, in his closing address to the jury. The same law, said Ullman, was written into the statute books of this state at a time when they branded, burned men for slight offenses and hung some people because they thought they were imbued with supernatural powers.

DEMPSEY STARTS TRAINING

Arrives at New York From West for Big Fight.

Heavyweight champion Jack Dempsey has arrived in New York from the west to begin training for his contest with Georges Carpentier in New Jersey, July 2nd.

Dempsey stated that he weighed 191 pounds and would start active preparations for the bout as soon as the definite site of the match was announced. He will lead up to this work by spending the next two weeks at the home of Freddy Welsh, where he will play golf and do light outdoor training, including long walks.

CENTRAL ALBERTA SPORT

A bill has been introduced into the Alberta legislature to place the regulation of amateur and professional sport in that province under the Public Utilities Board.

It provides that all amateur and professional athletic organizations shall be registered with the board, and gives the board power to make rules and regulations governing the conduct and management of all athletic associations, leagues and clubs in the province. It also empowers the board of its own initiative or on application of any organization, or any member of an organization, to investigate complaints, and relieve it of the necessity of observing the technical rules of evidence in conducting examinations.

Soccer Abandoned for Baseball

The effort to secure an all-star soccer team in the Halleybury district so as to issue a challenge to the Scottish team who are to tour Canada during the coming summer has met with failure. It had been planned to hold the event in the new Lakewood Park at Halleybury, but the uncertainty of being able to secure a sufficiently strong line-up has led to a cancellation of the plans.

In the meantime, however, a busy season in the other lines of sport, particularly baseball, is now practically assured, and there is every reason to believe the number of teams and the measure of interest will exceed any previous season in the history of Timiskaming.

The old schooner now lies, stripped of all fittings, at a shipyard in Boston.

HARNESS CIRCUIT

Good Racing Assured at St. Lawrence Fair.

The Trotter and Pacer says: The St. Lawrence Fairs Circuit, a little chain of half-mile tracks just across the border of northern New York, is not so pretentious as the grand circuit or perhaps as some other organizations of courses similar to its own, yet it has done two things that indicate good sense and good taste on the part of its promoters. It has opened classes for the three-year-old pacers in which the hoppers are barred, and has bought silk caps and jackets for its drivers and helpers and made a rule that they must wear them.

Hoppers are an abomination. Everybody admits it, and there is no chance for an argument. Not improbably they will always be with us, like the poor, but if there is any possible way by which they can be exterminated it is by beginning at the beginning. A proverb written centuries ago in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it. May we not apply it to the pacer with equal truth? Could we have, as we once started to have, a rule that would forbid use of the hoppers until the horse was four or five years old, there would be no need of them afterward in a large majority of cases.

The rule requiring the drivers and their attendants to sport silk is not less an indication of good taste and sense a measure that will command the appreciation of racegoers. Every intelligent racing manager realizes this, but not one in one hundred has comprehended the effect so fully as to induce him to provide the silks for the drivers to wear. The "top-jocks," of course, have their own silk colors, but many of the humped ones have not, though, doubtless, all would be glad to wear them. Our Canadian cousins have set a pattern that should be imitated. The spectacular features of a race are not less attractive than the excitement over a close finish or a fast mile, and a sheen of var-colored silk flashing in a field, struggling for the wire enhances the contest to every person of good taste.

WALL STREET SITTING UP; BROKERS FAVOR DEMPSEY

Wall street, New York, is beginning to perk up on the Dempsey-Carpentier bout. Several wagers have been reported, with Dempsey as the favorite, although in most cases the odds were very short. One member of a well-known financial house placed \$3,000 to \$2,000 Saturday night that the American will beat the Frenchman inside of twelve rounds.

The supporters of the Frenchman figure that if Dempsey was boxed a Dempsey bout when he met Bill Brennan, the flashy Georges has more than a look-in with the titleholder.

Tex Rickard has promised to announce to-morrow the exact spot in Jersey city City where Jack and Georges will settle their little difficulties.

DON'TS FOR FIGHTERS

Georges Carpentier, heavyweight champion of Europe, and challenger of Jack Dempsey, whose first appearance in any ring in America is pictured in "The Wonder Man," the Robertson-Cole Super Special, gives valuable advice as well as a keen insight into the character and methods of this unusual master of the ring in a series of "Don'ts for Fighters."

Don't overtrain—I have found it harmful to work too hard while training.

Don't let the brain get rusty while hardening your muscles—think out your plan of battle.

Don't show your uneasiness if you feel that way—enter the ring with a smile.

Don't be shy—on entering the ring go to your opponent's corner and shake his hand; forget the audience.

Don't forget to study your opponent while waiting for the bell. If he shows signs of nervousness that should be your tip to appear sure and confident.

Don't lose your temper.

Don't fight with bitterness, but with determination.

Don't crowd your opponent should you knock him down—give him a chance to get up.

Don't get flurried when you have your man "groggy"—take time to measure and place a decisive blow.

Don't be in too great a hurry if you are floored—think a way out of your difficulty.

Don't let an opponent see he has hurt you.

Don't sulk if you are beaten—shake your conqueror's hand and remember there's no disgrace in honorable defeat.

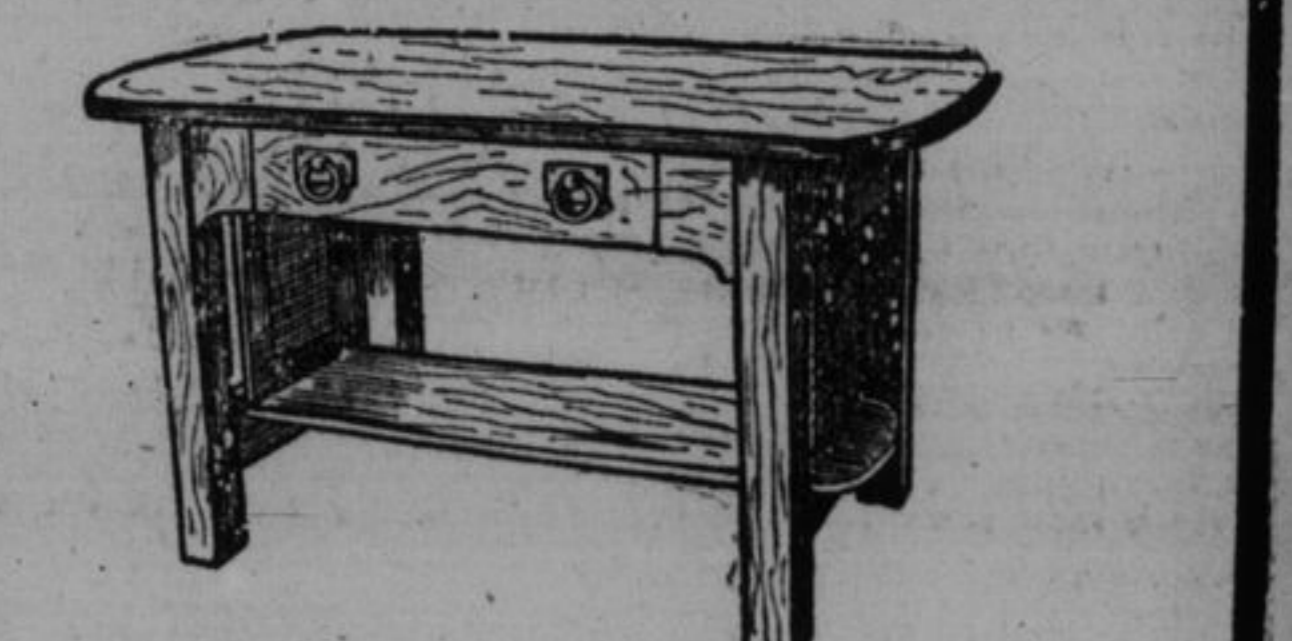
