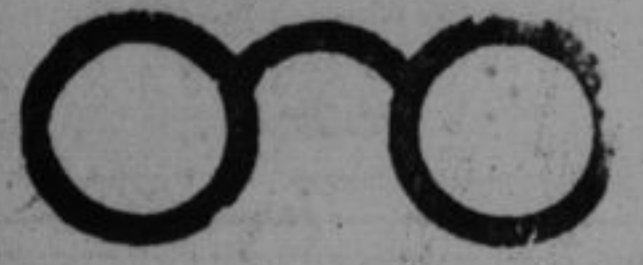

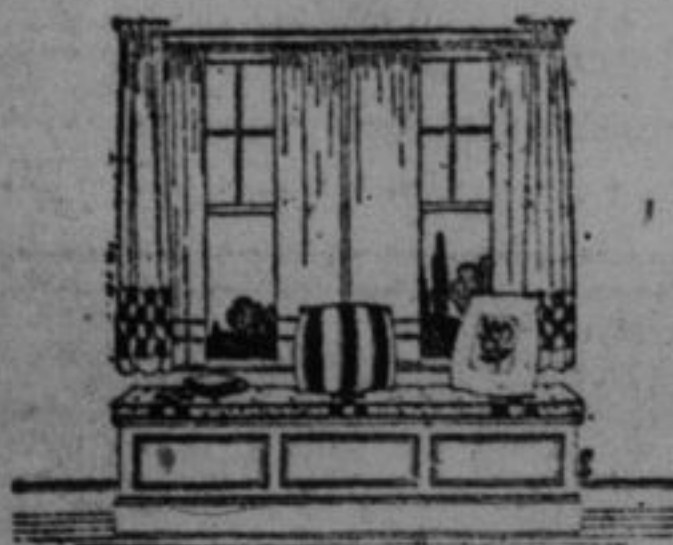

J. A. MAHARG RESIGNS HIS SEAT IN COMMONS

To Accept Post in Provincial Government of Sas- katchewan.

Ottawa, April 23.—J. A. Maharg,
Maple Creek, is resigning his seat in
the commons to accept a place in
the provincial government of Sas-
katchewan. Mr. Maharg, who was
born in Orangeville, is president of
the Saskatchewan Grain Growers'
Association and a director of the
Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator
Company. He was elected to parlia-
ment in 1917 as a supporter of the
Unionist government, headed by Sir
Robert Borden. He has since be-
come a member of the agrarian party
led by Hon. T. A. C. Crerar. He goes
to Saskatchewan to fill a vacancy in
the government of Hon. William
Martin, caused by the withdrawal of
Hon. W. E. Knowles from the pro-
vincial ministry.

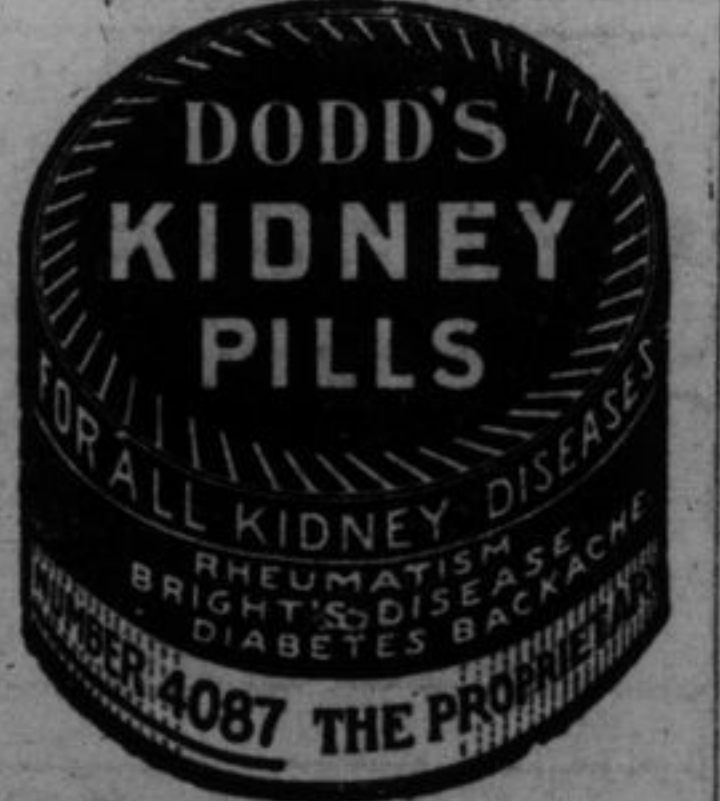
