
This novel is written in the quiet, easy manner of which Mr. Marshall is a master.

INTENDS TO APPOINT MINISTER TO THE U.S.

Premier Meighen Reaffirms Policy of Canadian Representative at Washington.

Ottawa, April 23.—The intention of the Dominion government to appoint a minister plenipotentiary to represent Canada in the United States, in accordance with the terms of the arrangement made between the Canadian, British and United States governments a year ago, was re-affirmed by Right Hon. Arthur Meighen in the commons. The prime minister, who spoke in the course of a lengthy debate upon the item of \$60,000 placed in the estimates "for Canadian representation in the United States," stated the only reason such a Canadian minister had not yet been appointed was that the government had not been able to decide upon a suitable man for the post.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King was heard agreeing with the leaders on the government side of the house that Canada's status as a nation warranted her in maintaining a diplomatic representative in the United States. He did not, however, approve of the arrangement that the Canadian minister should act as representative of the whole empire in the absence of the British ambassador from the United States. Canada's representative, he said, should not be called upon, at least, at the outset, to assume the larger responsibilities.

Hon. T. A. Crerar, the agrarian leader, also maintained Canada's right to appoint an ambassador to the United States and thought that such a representative should be named. Hon. W. S. Fielding, Q. C., and Hon. D. D. McKenzie, North Cape Breton, Liberals, strangely enough were found allied with W. F. Cockshutt, Brantford, Conservative, and Dr. Michael Clark, Red Deer, an agrarian, in opposition to the proposition that Canada should have direct diplomatic relations with the United States. "We have at present in our possession all the legitimate powers that a great self-governing dominion can hope to have as a constituent part of the Empire," declared Mr. Cockshutt, a viewpoint almost identical with that of Mr. Fielding. Thus in every party in the house the leader advocated representation at Washington and in each party at least one member opposed the idea.

AN R.M.C. GRADUATE

Frank P. Jones Has Taken High Place in Industrial World.

Frank P. Jones, who is taking over the management of the Riordan Company, Limited, was prominently before the public eye in the development of the Canadian trade after the war ended, and his name was strongly suggested on more than one occasion as minister of trade and commerce at Ottawa. His is vice-president and general manager of Canada Cement Company and earned an enviable "notoriety" a short time ago in telling his shareholders just where the company was at, and in promulgating and acting on the doctrine that surpluses are established for paying dividends in "lean" periods. About two years ago he was instrumental in creating the Consumers' Gas Company and is president of that company. He is a director as well of the Canadian Bank of Commerce; the Montreal Trust Company, and Ontario Steel Products, Limited. After graduating from the Royal Military College, Kingston, Mr. Jones started in with the D. F. Jones Manufacturing Company, at Gananoque. He afterwards joined the sales force of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company, and after that the Dominion Steel Company. In 1910 he was appointed general manager of the cement merger.

Selected for Revenue Post. Washington, April 23.—David H. Blair, of Winton-Salem, N.C., was nominated by President Harding to be commissioner of internal revenue. Mr. Blair will succeed William H. Williams, whose resignation was accepted recently. He never has held political office but has been prominent in Republican party affairs in North Carolina.
