QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY'S NEEDS.

In a recent address before the Kingston Board of Trade Dr. R. Bruce Taylor, principal of Queen's University, showed the importance of the university to the city, not only as a reason of the educational advantages it offers to the youth of Kingston, but also as one of its greatest business assets.

The university has been going through a process of development during the past thirty years and today it is a monument testifying to the broad vision of peculiarly gifted men who spent their lives for the practical realization of an educational institution that would meet the needs of Canadian citizenship.

Queen's has kept pace in the march of progress, but she labors under the handicap, common to such institutions, viz, lack of money. She has had many friends who marked their deep appreciation of her work by endowments for specific objects, but her current revenues are insufficient to meet expenses.
