MILITARY CAMP TRAINING INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

No Action Yet Taken on District Staff Recommendations.

Brig-Gen. King, G.O.C., M.D. No. 3, is in Ottawa. The chief matter under consideration now is the question of summer training. Proposals have been submitted to military headquarters, Ottawa, but no militia has been taken on them yet, consequently no forecast can be given as to what extent, if any, the recommendations of the district staff will be put into effect. The Canadian militia now has the benefit of the experience gained in the late war and as there are many officers available, who played important parts in actual engagements, the summer camp ought to be productive of practical results. With so many trained men throughout the country it would seem unnecessary to spend the greater part of the allotted time at foot drill and camp routine, but from the start, units might be employed in carrying out tactical movements as on a front with advanced posts, going through the actual work, as far as possible, they would be called upon to perform on active service. Toward the close of the war, units were not kept in drill camps for months, but were drafted to the reserve depots as soon as they could march and handle a rifle.

POTATOES LOW IN PRICE

The Wolfe Islanders Have More Than They Can Sell.

"The price of potatoes is the lowest that it has been for eight years," was the statement of a wholesale dealer to the Whig on Thursday morning. The dealer stated that at the present time he could buy great quantities of "spuds" at from 60 to 65 cents a bag. This time last year there was a great shortage and they were being sold at \$6.50 to \$7. a bag.

On Thursday morning when a representative of the Whig was speaking to a resident of Wolfe Island he learned that several of the farmers living on the island have more potatoes than they know what to do with. One farmer who lives some miles from Kingston states that with potatoes selling at 60 cents a bag it was cheaper to feed them to the stock than draw them to the city market.

It is certainly a good thing for people who are out of work, as a bag of potatoes will last a family some time. The wholesale price of butter has taken a tumble in price. On Thursday creamery butter was quoted at 58 to 60 cents a pound, and dairy butter from 40 to 45 cents a pound.

When asked the price of beef, a local wholesale dealer stated that it was up slightly, and it would likely remain that way until about the month of June after the cattle had gotten out on the pastures. Real good-dressed veal is selling at 17 cents a pound.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

The sloop Maggie L. arrived from Picton with a cargo of soft coal screenings for Robert Crawford. The steamers Easton, Glencaddin and Yorkton passed down yesterday. The steamer Maplehill passed up today.

The steamer Jeska cleared for Fairhaven.

The hull of the lighter barge Hoboken, which sank at the Breanan coal dock, Brockville, last September, after springing a leak, has been towed to the channel out of the way of navigation. The barge was owned in Ogdensburg, N. Y.

The water in the St. Lawrence is at the present time sixteen inches higher than at the corresponding period last year. This condition is expected to be a great aid to navigation.

The SS. Canadian Coaster, the new ship recently launched at the yards of the Collingwood Shipbuilding company, will be given her trial spin on Monday next. She will leave the wharf at 8 a.m. and proceed up the Bay of Quinte and return. A large number of officials of the company and prominent citizens will be on board.

The steamer Belleville, owned by the Canada Steamship Lines, in command of Captain D. B. Christie, will leave Kingston Saturday for Toronto to resume the regular Montreal-Bay of Quinte-Toronto sailings, the first departure being from Toronto, to May 2nd, and the first return from Montreal, May 6th.

WALL NOT HIGH ENOUGH

The Cause of the Investigation at the Female Prison.

The investigation now being conducted into the affairs of the female prison at Portsmouth penitentiary is the result of a mistake that was made when the wall surrounding the female department was not built according to the original plan. When the building was erected in the north-west garden, it was the intention to isolate the females from the males completely and had the plan been properly carried out it would have reduced the possibility of scandals to a minimum. The plan called for a stone wall twelve feet in height that would have shut off all view of the garden and grounds from the male departments. The change in the plans was made in 1912. The wall was built about five feet above the level of the roadway, and, owing to this fact, the female prisoners have had to be kept shut within doors and never given the benefit of the little freedom for exercise the garden afforded. They had full view from their windows of every movement of the male prisoners.
