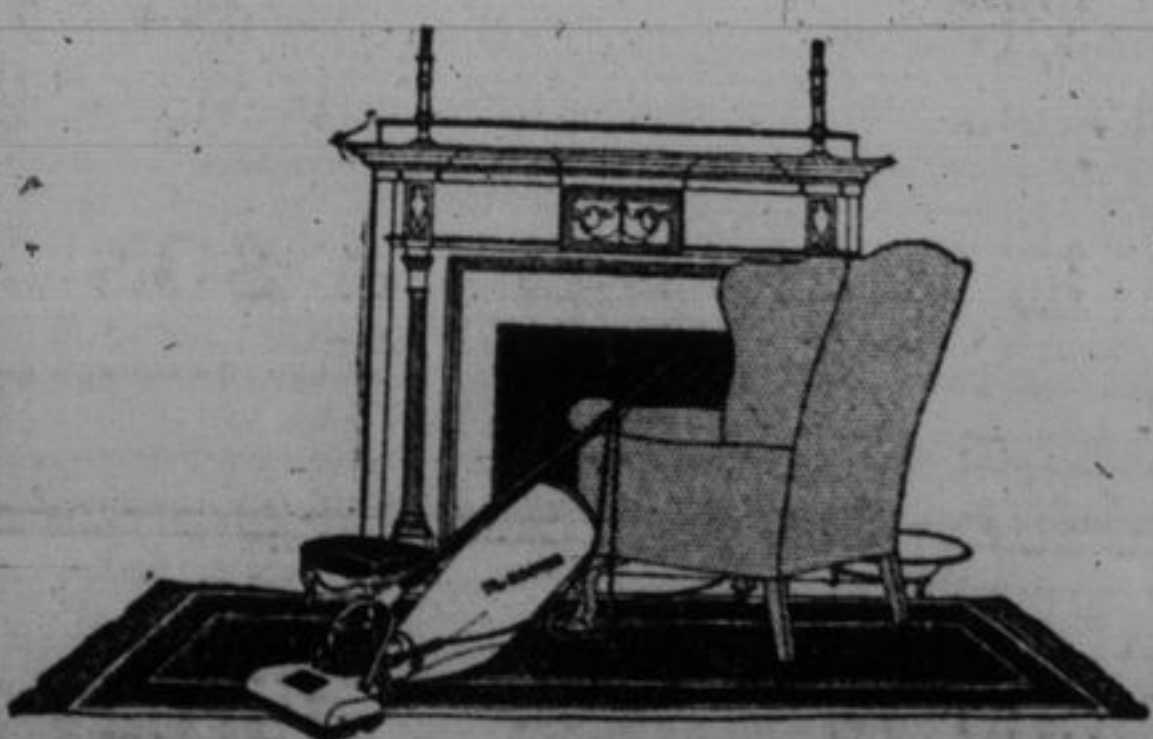

Montreal, April 29.—The population of Montreal last year, according to estimates made by the city assessors, was 758,045 people, of whom 475,803 were French-Canadians; 101,271 English; 55,173 Irish; 31,724 Scotch, and 94,975 of other nationalities.

TURKISH HAREM PASSING

Poverty and the Need For House Room Are the Causes.

Constantinople, April 29.—The Turkish harem is quickly passing as a part of the Turkish home. Poverty and the need for house room are the causes.

The Turkish pashas, effendis, beys and all the well-to-do of other days, whose homes were divided into the harem and the haremlik, that is, one half of a mansion or palace for the women and the others for the men, are parting with this luxury as they have parted with their carriages, horses, jewels and lands. The peasants still keep a division of their houses for the privacy of their wives and daughters and children.

Many Turkish women deplore the necessity which compels them to live like the "poor European". They declare that they were happier when living apart, that the home was easier to manage and their husbands, too.

In Constantinople the majority of the private houses show this division, but the chance to rent one side of the house, or else the requisitions of Allied troops, has caused families to live together in only one half of their homes.

Foreigners are getting for the first time a peep into the more aristocratic of these old homes, until now hidden in the mystery of protecting garden walls, latticed windows and huge gates or doorways. The visit often reveals a charming interior, with room, walls and ceilings decorated with fresco paintings, and mosaics showing charming views of mosques, mountains, seas, forests, or rivers of the old empire.

As the homes are vacated, their elaborate European furniture, together with much of the collections of brocades, gossamer silks and fine rugs are sold at auctions held in the house or else sent to the dealers or auction room of the Old Bazaar.

CANNOT DIGEST BIG MAIL

Marshal Foch Receives a Large Amount of Correspondence Daily.

Paris, April 29.—Marshal Foch says that one of his great regrets is that he has not time enough to properly digest the big mail he receives. Like most men in his conspicuous position he gets daily a batch of correspondence that keeps his aids busy sifting the trivial and eccentric from the important and interesting.

Friends and enemies alike write him profusely and their letters run the whole gamut from ecstatic adulation to frenzied vituperation. This morning he received a dozen letters and as many packages from the same person, an American. All were registered. The American must have known that this class of mail gets first attention by the marshal's staff.

Nearly every mail brings a letter from some pro-German in America inviting the marshal to have himself hanged or to go to the place of fire and brimstone. By every mail someone sends him an ode or a song written in his honor.

Mothers write him informing him they have named the finest baby in the world after him, and American fathers send word that they would have taken a good drink in his honor on some anniversary or other had not the United States gone dry.

Authors send him their books and inventors forward descriptions of wonderful new engines of destruction or schemes to suppress war.

The marshal's advice is asked on all the subjects with which, he says, he is least familiar.

What has amused him most lately was a post card received from San Francisco with the photographs of two pickaninnies and the inscription, "Here's Young America."

Riot Breaks Out in India Troops Rushed to District

Bombay, India, April 29.—The Times of India says a serious riot is reported to have occurred at Malegaon, northeast of Nasik. The telegraph wires in that district have been cut and no details of the riot have been received, although a number of constables are reported to have been killed and a sub-inspector and a magistrate injured. Troops and police have been sent to the scene.

ILLEGAL TIMBER CUTTING

North Bay Timber Agent Tells of Many Trespasses.

Toronto, April 29.—Apparently extensive cutting of pine without authority has taken place in Northern Ontario. Before the Timber Commission at North Bay Crown Timber Agent J. T. McDougall named a list of several important townships where this has been done by the Spanish River Pulp & Paper Mills, who, in addition, are alleged to have left their debris, thus increasing the fire hazard.
