Some years ago I was talking with the head of one of the three largest universities in the United States. He fairly startled me with the tenacity of his earnestness as he told me of the confidence brought to him by students; and of his own absolute conviction that Christianity, applied, personal, life-changing Christianity, was the greatest need of these young men. He said that to put these thousands of youth was more important than any or all of their classroom studies; and he was outspoken in his eagerness that some special measures might be taken for the promotion of a revival of Christianity in the student body.

Getting Down to Bed Rock

Is it not evident that education which does not make the student wise toward God may be more of a bane than a boon? Obviously, true education goes deeper than memory; it has its roots in the subsoil of life. We are now witnessing in all the world an education that has nothing to do with books; it may be called education by cataclysm. It has been years of awakening and upheaval of life over all the earth have been more of an intellectual and social quickening than centuries of formal schooling.

Undoubtedly, there is new stir and ferment and power enough among mankind in the mass today to wreck all of our inherited civilization, unless it all be guided by a spirit of reverence and responsibility. There is no hope that education can avert this possible calamity; many university graduates are leading the forces of unrest into extreme radicalism. Only the tested impulses and inspirations and inhibitions of Christianity can meet this universal emergency. This is a day to remember that "if any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, who giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not, and it shall be given him."

Getting right down to bed rock, we cannot overlook the fact that the Sunday School, and all that it represents, stands for an education which relates human life to God and to the eternal verities. It awakens and implants the Divine impulses; so that it is a matter of simple observation that the one hour a week in Sunday School has meant more to a young life than its week of secular teaching. For while education is a matter of years, wisdom is a matter of illumination.

Their lives are spun as the threads of your cloak, through the warp and the woof of your Whole; Your hands are theirs and your eyes are theirs, and your mold and your Self and your Soul. The dreams they dreamed and the fights they fought and the prayers that their lips have prayed. Shall be your dreams and shall be your prayers; your fights are the fights they made. The lives they lived and the deaths they died you shall live and die again; In you is the seed of a million hopes of a million maids and men. "God grant, my son, that you fight the fight and hold to the faith. Amen!"
