### CLASH AT THE HOSPITAL OVER NURSES' REGISTER

The Alumnae Association Is Told Register Must Be Taken Elsewhere.

A clash is reported between the management committee of the General Hospital, governors and the Nurses' Alumnae Association of that institution. For years the Alumnae association, by permission, has kept its nurses register at the hospital. Miss Hunter looked after the register gratuitously for a long time, and until her duties became too onerous. Then the association put it in the hands of the porter at the institution, paying him \$100 a year. Now the management committee has informed the alumnae association that the register is to be no longer kept at the hospital and that it must be removed. And the alumnae members feel very much aggrieved and are likely to drop out from all activities in connection with the hospital. They have the support of some of the governors, one of whom said:

"I am opposed to doing anything to antagonize the alumnae, who have done so much for the hospital. They have raised thousands of dollars for the institution and contributed the first two thousand dollars to build the nurses home. We have not forgotten that last January, when the governing board was threatened by a general strike of the nurses-in-training, that all the leading members of the alumnae association, when appealed to, instantly volunteered their services to go into the hospital and take charge of the nursing so that the strike would not be neglected at that critical time."

It is understood that a meeting of the alumnae association is to be held early next week to discuss the action of the hospital board of management and ask that the matter be referred to the governing board as a whole to finally settle.

#### MOVING TO MONTREAL.

The C.M.B.A. Officers Will Be on Notre Dame Street.

The removal of the contents of the head office of the C.M.B.A. from Kingston to Montreal was completed on Thursday and Mr. Howison and the members of his staff leave Kingston to-day to open the new office for Canada, which is located on Notre Dame street. When the C.M.B.A. was organized as a benefit association it was located at London, Ont. About twenty years ago the office was moved to Kingston, and it is expected that Montreal will now remain the permanent headquarters.

#### Horsemen's Executive Meets.

A meeting of the executive committee of the 1,000 Island Short Ship Racing Circuit took place in the Hotel Randolph on Friday evening. M. S. Grace, president, occupied the chair and representatives were present from Gananoque, Belleville, and Napanee, while communications were received by Secretary E. J. Metcalfe from other points.

Under present arrangements it is likely that Kingston will give races at the fair grounds on June 3rd, although it was intended to postpone them until July 24th-25th, when the big meet takes place.

### ROMANTIC STORY OF CHILD OF FOUR

Salvationists Find Home in Canada For Nameless Waif of Liverpool Slums.

Quebec, April 30.—Among the ninety-seven children under sixteen years of age, who are being brought out to Canada for adoption by the Salvation Army of the Minnedouche on her first trip up the St. Lawrence this year is "Stuart William Headley," aged four, who will be adopted by a family in the province of Quebec. "Stuart's" real name is not known. He was picked up by the Salvationists when a few days old in a little basket in the slums of Liverpool. His foster parents, who are well to do, have not seen him yet, but he is stated to be a bright cheerful little fellow, good looking and one who cannot fail to fill the place that the death of the only child of his new mother has left vacant so long.

### Costly Bull Is Dead; Was Bred in Brockville

Brockville, Ont., April 30.—A. C. Hardy, proprietor of Avondale stock farm here, has been notified of the death at the Carnation farms in Seattle, Washington, of his famous Holstein bull, which he sold at an auction in Milwaukee, Wis., for the record sum of \$106,000. The animal was purchased four years ago by a representative of the Carnation farms at the age of six months and the price paid for the calf has never been equalled on the North American continent. The bull in some manner injured its knee and the treatment applied on the sore was licked off by the thoroughbred, causing it to be poisoned.

### Lord Leveson-Gower Dies.

Cape Town, South Africa, April 30.—Lord Alastair Leveson Gower has died in a hospital at Johannesburg from malaria contracted during a big-game hunting expedition in Rhodesia. Lord Leveson Gower was the eldest brother and heir presumptive of the fifth Duke of Sutherland. He was born in 1859.

### To Buy Glasses for Scholars.

Hamilton, April 30.—Since reports made by public school nurses show a number of pupils with defective eyesight to be badly in need of eye-glasses, Relief Officer J. H. McMenamy was authorized to purchase such glasses with civic funds in all cases where the parents of the pupils do not own property or have not the pecuniary means to do so. "The least we can do," said Mayor Copley, "is to help these children to obtain the education that it is their right to obtain."

#### A PARSONAGE EVENT.


Princess Street Church Ladies Hold Tea and Sale.
