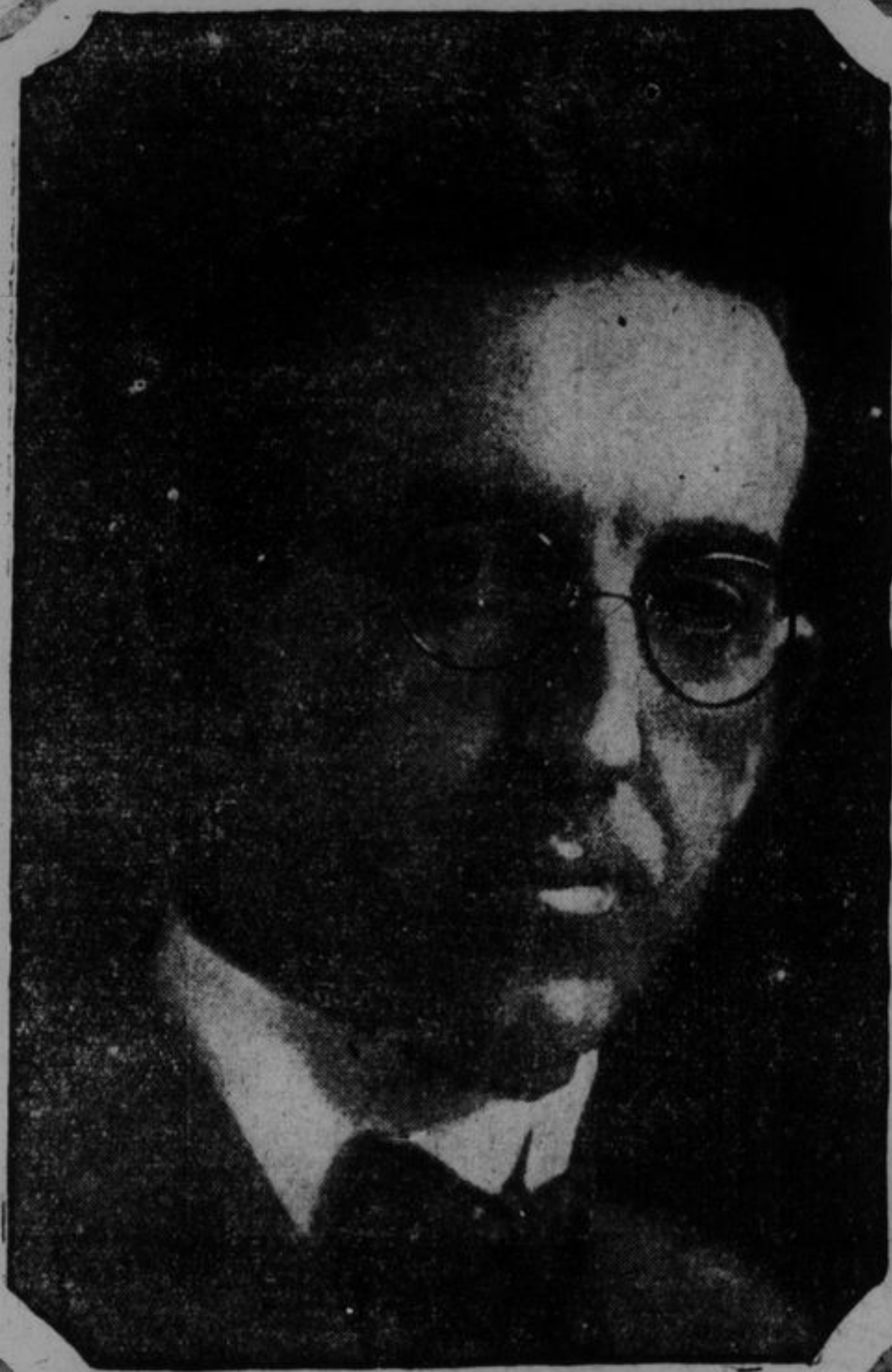

OBJECTS OF THE ROTARY CLUB ARE TO ENCOURAGE HIGH ETHICS

The "objects" of the Rotary Club, as set forth in the constitution, are to encourage and foster:

- High ethical standards in business and professions.
- The ideal of SERVICE as the basis of all worthy enterprise.
- The active interest of every Rotarian in the civic, commercial, social and moral welfare of his community.
- The development of a broad acquaintance as an opportunity for service as well as an aid to success.
- The interchange of ideas and of increasing the efficiency and usefulness of all legitimate occupations and the dignifying of the occupations of each Rotarian as affording him an opportunity to serve society.

Rotary Club Facts Briefly Outlined

First club organized with four members in Chicago in 1905. Name "Rotary" adopted because original club "rotated" meetings

among business offices of members. Limited membership plan is one of foundations of Rotary strength. Rotary has no "paid" organizers, and international association is "mighty particular" about accepting new clubs. There are now over 800 clubs with a total membership of 65,000. There are many Rotary clubs now

in foreign countries. No Rotary club has ever failed to make good; none has ever surrendered its charter. Rotary clubs have high percentage of attendance of members at meetings. Average attendance of all clubs in United and Canada, in December, 77.40 per cent. The Ottawa club was organized in

1916. It now has 129 members. Rotary principles and activities are based upon the belief that "He Profits Most Who Serves Best."

Benefits of Rotary

Enlightenment as to other men's work, problems, and successes. Education in methods that increase efficiency. Stimulation of your desire to be of service to your fellowmen and society in general. Business returns that come from enlarging your acquaintance and inspiring confidence in you and your business.

STANDS FOR YOUTH

That means keeping alive in you the spirit of enthusiasm. Not quitting because you are tired and want to go to bed. Not getting dried up and fossilized. Not kicking at every new thing you hear, just because it's new to you. Taking a live interest in the world around you and feeling that there's a lot in it to amuse you and cheer you, a lot in it to fight for and to gain. A man who has lost interest in things is simply waiting to be buried. Youth keeps up interest in things. It's a good trait. Rotary stands for Youth.

Rotary Creed Is Matter of Service

The Rotary platform is concise statement of the principles and ethics guiding and actuating all Rotary clubs. "The Rotary club demands fair dealings, honest methods, and high standards in business," is the theme of this platform, and its last sentence, "He profits most who serves best," has been adopted as the latter part of the official slogan, which reads: "Service Above Self—He Profits Most Who Serves Best."

Obligations of Rotary

To attend meetings regularly. To pay my dues promptly. To do my part when called upon. To be a big-hearted, broad-minded man—a man of energy and action—a real man—a Rotarian.
