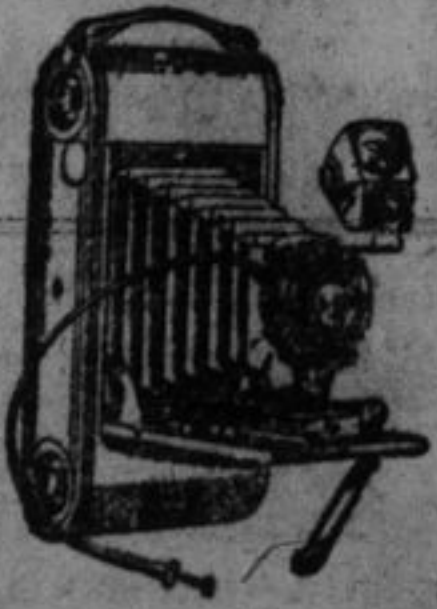


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## World of Sport

### Horse Races Held At Fair Grounds

A great exhibition of horse racing was held at the fair grounds by the Gentlemen's Driving and Matties Club on Wednesday afternoon. There was a large attendance of enthusiastic sportsmen and lovers of horses, and the occasion was one of real enjoyment. There were four classes of events, and eleven horses were entered and competed for silver cups to be awarded at the end of the season. There were some surprises, and from indications that only the knowing one can correctly interpret, June 3rd will see sensations on the Kingston track, for there are some new horses in the local club.

In "A" class, Bernard McKinney, the famous Kingston trotter, was beaten in three straight heats by Little Daisy. Class "B" was won by Lady Derilise in three straight heats. Brino Baron, a well-known local trotter, won class "C" over Lady Zombro, and class "D" was won by Miss Sinnott, a new trotter recently purchased in Chicago by George Barragh, the veteran trackman.

Of all these events, class "A" provided the best races and the spectators showed their appreciation by applause, and expressed their deep appreciation of the work of the Kingston Gentlemen's Driving and Matties Club for putting on such a fine afternoon's sport. Class "B" excited great interest because all of the horses are young and have shown vast improvement since last year. Some possess qualities that are coming rapidly to the front. The marked improvement in the horses is a tribute to the club. The drivers, too, are improving their opportunities and the whole programme passed off smoothly.

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International Amateur Athletic Federation when it meets in Geneva, May 23rd.

F. W. Rublen, secretary of the A. A. U., says Thursday on the Mauritanian-for-Switzerland, where he will attend a series of important international meetings.

He will offer for recognition twenty-three records made by American athletes since 1914, but Paddock's marks will not be included and will have to wait four years for official acceptance.

Rublen explained to-day that Paddock's records could not be offered because they cannot be accepted by the A. A. U. until the annual convention of the union next November.

The international Olympic committee meets in Lausanne during the week of June 2nd to 7th.

America will seek to have a uniform programme and schedule of events adopted for all Olympic games of the future, Rublen said. In the past the country acting as host to the world's athletes was allowed to present any programme desired.

Rublen also will try to get the international delegates to provide for suitable quarters and training facilities at all the games.

The American committee will not disclose its choice for the site of the 1924 Olympic games. Reports from the other side indicate that Paris has lined up enough European voters to assure the next Olympics being held in the French capital. The French are prepared to erect a fine stadium and they would like to have Paris adopted as a permanent place for the games.

### Sunday School Baseball.

In the eighth innings, Gilbert McKelvey, manager of the Sydenham team, who played short-stop, connected with the ball and made a home run.

### Pitching and Bating.

There is no great argument to it. Weak hitting ball clubs with fine pitching staffs have won more than one pennant, but we can't recall of a pennant winning club rocking along on a poor pitching staff.

In 1906 the White Sox had the weakest hitting club in either league—pitching along on a club average of .321.

Yet they won a world's championship with Niek Altrock, Ed. Walsh and Doc. White, plus their allotment of brains and speed.

Brooklyn, with its great pitching staff, has more of a pennant asset than the Yanks have with all their slugging power.

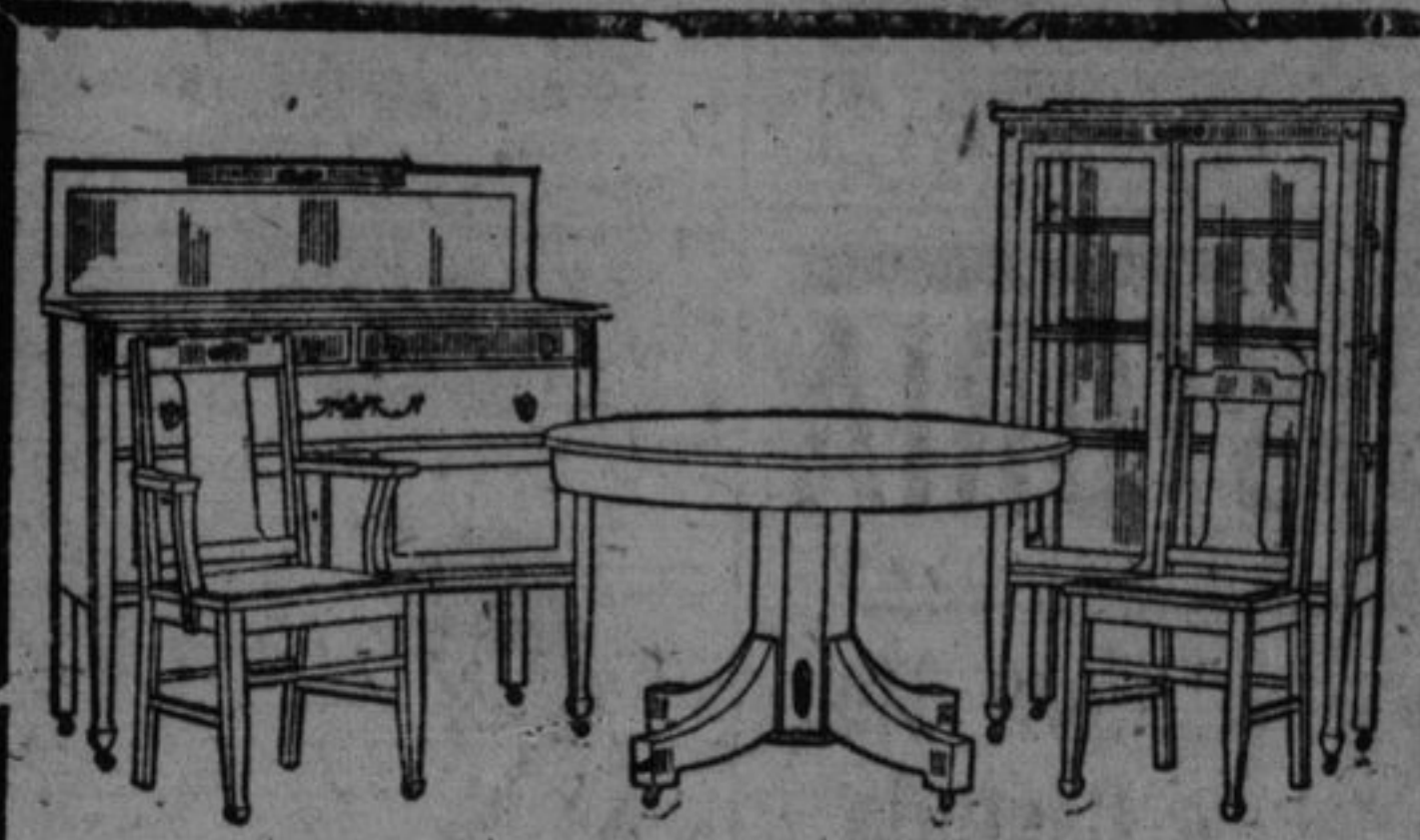
A steady, effective pitcher can hold a ball club together more than any single factor.

Fackler from Sheffield United and W. Davies, the Welsh International, for \$10,000 each. The Bolton Wanderers Club received a record sum from gate receipts this season, \$213,500 being taken at the turnstiles.
