SIR CAMPBELL STUART, K.B.E. INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

To Visit Kingston Along With His Mother During Next Week.

Sir Campbell Stuart, who is to address the leading clubs of this city next week, is one of the Canadians who since the war have settled in England, and who are making the dominion still better known. He is able also to advance its interests, seeing that he is Managing Director of the London Times, one of the most influential positions imaginable.

Taken to England as an officer in the Duchess of Connaught's Rangers, which he was himself largely instrumental in raising in his native city, of Montreal, Major Stuart, as he then was, displayed such aptitudes for organization and management that he became military attaché to the British embassy at Washington. He was successively vice-chairman of the London headquarters of the British war mission to the United States and, under Lord Northcliffe, deputy director of propaganda in enemy countries. Of the work attempted and successfully carried through in this connection he has given a fascinating account in "The Secrets of Crewe House," which the published last year, winning the coveted distinction of being reviewed by one of Mr. Punch's "learned clerks." Since returning to civil life, Sir Campbell has been knighted and has been in turn editor of the Daily Mail and deputy chairman of the London Times, of which he is now managing director.

With Kingston, which he is visiting for the first time, Sir Campbell has a hereditary connection, being a great-grandson of the Rev. John Stuart, D.D., the first missionary of the church of England in this province and the first incumbent of Kingston. Sir Campbell's great-grandfather, the Hon. Andrew Stuart, was at the time of his death solicitor-general of Lower Canada and his grandfather, Henry Stuart, Q.C., was a very prominent barrister, who married the daughter of one of Canada's most distinguished and influential chief justices, the Hon. William Smith, U.E.L.

With affairs Sir Campbell has been intimately connected all his life, his father, Ernest Stuart, having been a practising notary in the city of Montreal and his maternal grandfather, C. J. Brydges, whose name was well and honorably known for many years in connection with the Grand Trunk Railway. Sir Campbell himself has many business interests in this country to which he will pay some attention during his stay on this side, although he has come over for a holiday, accompanied by his mother, who won distinction by her activities in connection with the Canadian Red Cross.

COLLECT MORE GARBAGE THAN EVER BEFORE

The Contractors Say That the Incinerator Cannot Handle Their Collections.

The garbage collection contractors state that they are collecting more garbage and refuse than has ever been collected before in Kingston during the same period of time. They have had charge of the collection since the first of April, and more than once have had to cart garbage to the dump owing to the inability of the incinerator to handle the quantity. They say that if the incinerator attendants have to work overtime it is because much more garbage is being handled, and the city is being cleaned up as it should be. Their drivers bring in more loads during the day than was done before, the last loads coming in shortly before five o'clock. If garbage is lying around in the evenings it is because the incinerator is not large enough to handle the amount now being collected.

If this continues to be the case it is evident that the health committee will have to work its incinerator staff nine instead of eight hours a day.

Straws and Hats.

George VanHorne has a very nice window display in straw hats which speaks well for his enterprise and originality and that of his staff. The whole window is filled with straw, with large sheaves of grain standing up here and there and in among the sheaves the latest styles in straw hats, bright, white, and new, are scattered. One old veteran with the crown broken is labelled 1920, while two or three of the others are marked 1921. These attractive window displays brighten up the business section and reflect credit on the store using them.

Public Library Board.

At a meeting of the Public Library Board on Friday afternoon, with A. N. Lyster in the chair, a number of important matters were dealt with. Accounts amounting to \$91 were passed and the purchase of 500 new books was authorized. Mrs. Kennedy, the manager, exhibited samples of magazine covers made at the library under her supervision, at a trifling cost. The circulation figures presented show that there is a great increase in the demands of the citizens for good reading.
