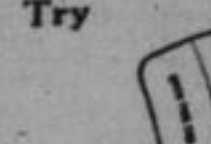

TOO 'NOBLE' TO WORK

An impecunious young European nobleman has appealed to the associated charities in Washington for relief. He says that an allowance given him by an uncle is not even sufficient to buy his cigarettes that he has no other income, and that work is unworthy of a nobleman. Poor fellow! He is to be pitied, not so much because he is short on cigarettes as that he is so lamentably short in his conception of the true qualities of a nobleman.

This young man's ancestor who first brought the title into the family was probably something of a man. He may have been a hero in war or a leader in industry. He may have had real nobility. But unfortunately he could transmit only the title. And that title has made a fool of the young man.

Nobility would not be such a bad thing, if the nobility itself were hereditary. Most of the founders of the old European families were rugged, rough-and-ready fellows who had no false pride or nasty-niceness about them. But the law that preserves the rank cannot preserve the character.

Hereditary nobility is held in contempt in this country for the simple reason that it is only an empty name. It unfits a man for usefulness. It makes him the exact opposite of a noble.

This young nobleman felt no shame in accepting his uncle's allowance. He sees nothing improper in his appeal for charity. But work? That is beneath him. Work, he thinks, would tarnish his title.

Well, maybe it would. Certainly a patent of nobility is worth nothing to a man if he must stand on his own feet anyway. And the man who doesn't stand on his own feet isn't much of a man, though he have a line of ancestry reaching back to Adam. So if the title is tarnished it doesn't matter much. A title that keeps one from being a man ought to be more than tarnished.

This young nobleman has yet to learn that in this country, and in this new age every man must make his own title of nobility.

He must learn that in these days a paper-by-patent commands no standing whatever.

The children had found an old hand axe which had been thrown out and while at play one of the little ones hit Leon on the head cutting a gash to close which Dr. Walmsey found several stitches necessary.

Watertown Y. Strong Organization The Watertown Y.M.C.A. now has 1,797 members and a controversy on its hands. Rev. George F. Shepherd criticised it recently for allowing smoking at its recent Fathers' and Sons' banquet. Mr. Shepherd said he didn't want to prohibit tobacco, but he thought that smoking there furnished a poor example to the young men.

Keep Out U. S. Corn A Kingston grain dealer says that what is needed is for the Canadian government to keep out United States corn for a year in retaliation for the U. S. embargo against Canada. If corn were kept out, barley and oats grown in Canada could be used instead, quite profitably. Millions of bushels of American corn come into Canada each year, and this help keeps the exchange rate high.

Poisoned by Bullhead Edward Rogers, Alexandria Bay, N. Y., while fishing recently, had the misfortune to run the horn of a bullhead into the first finger of his left hand, causing blood poisoning. Dr. C. B. Forsyth, who dressed the finger, advised him to go to the hospital for further treatment. Mr. Rogers went at once to the hospital, Watertown, and Dr. Farmer amputated the finger. It is thought that he will not have to lose the hand.

Dismantling Plant J. Crawford, Perth, owner of the premises, is dismantling the brick yard and will soon have his three acres cleared of the brick arches, etc., and converted into a plowed field. Many houses and shops in Perth and surrounding country have been built out of the red and white brick from this field and builders will now have to look elsewhere for material.

Home from Norway House Rev. G. F. Denyes, son of H. K. Denyes, M.P.P., for East Hastings, is home from Norway House, on Hudson's Bay, where he has been principal of the government schools. There are about 30 white people up there, including a couple of R. C. M. P. at the post. It took him nearly two weeks to get to Winnipeg. He is both school teacher and missionary and is in command at one of the outposts of the Empire, making cit-

izens out of people far below the well known submerged tenth. He is a fine type of young Canadian. He starts back on Monday next.

The Late Matura J. Cronk Miss Matura J. Cronk, who suffered greatly since she had a second stroke about a month ago, passed away quietly on Saturday night, and was buried at Wellington cemetery on Monday afternoon. She was a native of Prince Edward county and was in her 67th year. When a child an accident caused blindness. She was one of the first pupils of the Institute for the Blind at Brantford and later became a tutor. In 1918 sickness overtook her. She was remarkably clever with her fingers and specialized in bead work and knitting and was also an accomplished musician.

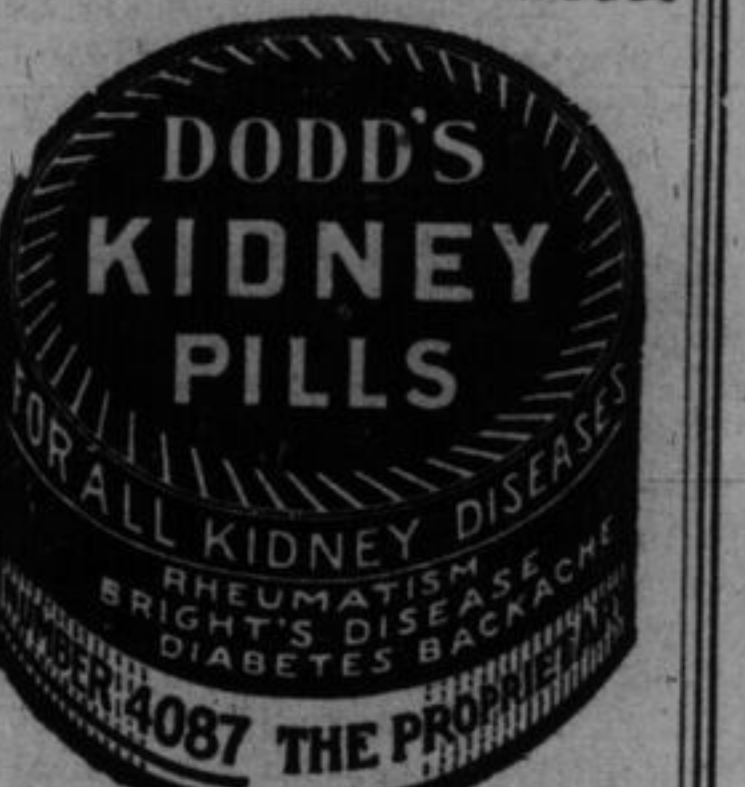
At Non-Jury Assizes. Hon. Mr. Justice Masten will preside at the session of the non-jury assizes to open Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
