TENEMENT POOR SUFFER MOST

Theatres are crowded—it's hard to get a seat, down-stairs, near the front—or anywhere else, at the good shows. And they are building many new play-houses in our big cities.

Automobile licenses in the metropolitan areas are numbered by the hundreds thousand.

Hotels in town and at the resorts are filled with guests, and social functions are conducted with all the signs of prosperity.

The Dempsey-Carpenter prize-fight promoters are confident of taking in gate receipts to the amount of a million dollars.

And yet—most of us have been "hard hit" financially. Our incomes have been decreased and our outgo has increased. And we are planning to cut down expenses wherever it is possible.

Which shall be the first to go—luxuries or philanthropies? Remember that your philanthropies are somebody else's necessities.

Your contribution provides the barest essentials for life and health—food and rent and clothing and medicine, and the personal service rendered by nurses and visitors.

Philanthropic agencies have one of two courses open to them. They can limit the number of people whom they will help. Or, they can limit the amount of service to be given each person.

But—remember that they never give any one person more than just enough to provide the merest necessities, and that in such times as these the number of people to be helped is always greater than when their supporters are best able to contribute toward their work.

That's the pity of it. Furthermore, the need for health-work is intensified during periods of industrial depression, because the quality of the food the people in the tenements can buy becomes poorer and there isn't enough, even of the poor kind.

Incomes in the tenements are at best quite irregular, and the average family is ordinarily just about two weeks ahead of actual need. And when unemployment overtakes them it doesn't take long for poverty to grip them.

Now please—don't say that they should have saved when times were good.
