before the road is completed.

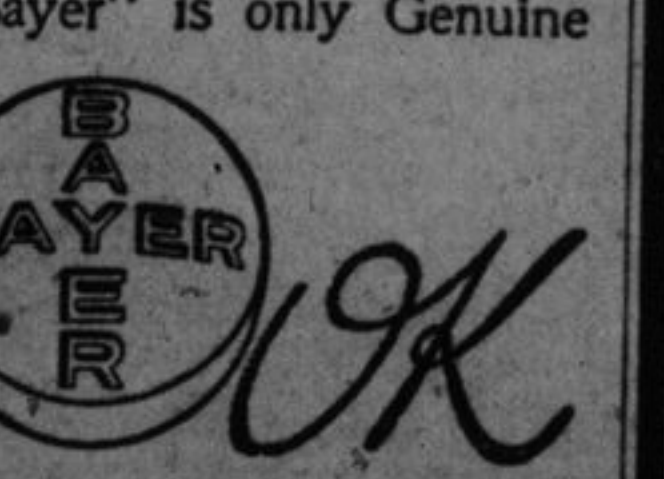
