TWO OF THE VERY LATEST FROCKS

The Sash Is Now Distinctive Part of Some Dresses



Note This Broad Many-Colored Sash and This Narrow Example.

The sash is a most valuable adjunct to many of the new frocks. It is developed in a host of different ways. Sometimes it is fashioned from the same material as the frock and attains distinction by a colorful tassel or gay fringe.

An attractive interpretation of this mode is pictured in the blue serge dress at the left. The fabric chosen for its development is a heavy gros-grain silk enriched with stripes of varied colors. This is attached to the lower edge of the overblouse by embroidery which repeats the colors of the Roman-striped silk.

Touches of the embroidery appear about the neckline as well as the

tight-fitting cuffs.

The skirt is fashioned with a full circular tunic which is shortened toward the back and partly covered by the long sash ends that extend almost to the hem.

Another type of sash is shown on the dress at the right. Black satin is the material from which it is cut. Quite narrow, it is slipped through two jet rings at the side and the ends—two long and two short—are finished with long, black silk fringe.

Rows of the same kind of black silk fringe, although shorter in length, elaborate the black chiffon frock which is draped over black satin. Bands of the satin distinguish the wide cuffs.

SUBSCRIBE \$100,000 IN HALF AN HOUR

A. J. Freiman, Ottawa, Gives \$10,000 to Palestine Reparation Fund, Montreal.

Montreal, May 20.—As the result of a dinner given by Mark Workman, which was attended by a large number of Jewish citizens at the Windsor hotel, to inaugurate the financial campaign for Montreal's contribution to the Palestine Reparation Fund, over \$100,000 was subscribed within half an hour after the opening of the list and encouragement given for the belief that no trouble would be experienced in reaching the objective of the campaign, viz., \$400,000.

The subscriptions were headed by two donations of \$10,000 each by Mark Workman and A. J. Freiman, Ottawa, president of the Zionist Federation of Canada, a guest of the evening.
