MUST SHOW THEIR MONEY

Before Bank Promoters Will Receive Power From Senate to Incorporate.

Ottawa, May 21.—No promoter need come before the senatorial committee on banking and commerce with the object of getting power to incorporate a bank unless first a substantial body of men has subscribed sufficient money to make the committee believe that a real, solid financial institution will be established.

This is the decision arrived at by the committee after considering several applications for incorporation of banks. One of these projects was for the establishment of the Commonwealth Bank of Canada, with headquarters at Toronto. The promoters were told that if they would come again with a substantial amount of money subscribed by responsible men in Canada their request would be granted, but it was the committee's feeling that that should be done before incorporation was granted.

The Great West Bank of Canada is another proposal which came before parliament last session, and then was granted the right to incorporate, but since then it has not been able to get the amount of money necessary to make it eligible for the certificate required by Section 16 of the Bank Act. Senator J. H. Ross, of Moose Jaw, brought in a bill asking for another year in which to get together this money. It was pointed out that one of the two promoters of the bank had died, that the past year has been a bad year in the west for launching such a venture, and that another year would make a difference.

It was at first intended to refuse this application, but Senator Laird asked for another year, pointing out that this was the first attempt to establish a banking institution with headquarters in the west, an institution which would keep all the money in the west for western developments, and that it would create an unpleasant impression in the west if the application for an additional year were refused. It would be said, though it were untrue, that eastern financial interests were responsible for the blocking.

The senate accepted this reasoning, and so the Great West Bank has another year in which to fulfil all conditions laid down by the Bank Act.

The Bank Act cannot be amended before 1923 in some of its principal features, it is stated, and until that happens the members of the banking and commercial committee have adopted the principle of refusing all applications for incorporation where a substantial sum has not first been collected.

LIMITED TO APRIL

New Legislation Regarding Fishing For Pickeral.

Formerly the close season for pickeral extended throughout the months of April and May. This has now been limited to the month of April only, as the following new legislation, supplied to the Whig by W. D. Black, M.P.P., will show:

"In the other waters of the province to the southward but not including French River, Lake Nipissing and Mattawa River, no one shall fish for, catch or kill any pickeral (dore) from the first to the thirtieth day of April, in each year, both days inclusive, and in the other waters of the province to the north and northwest of and including the said French River, Lake Nipissing and Mattawa River, no one shall fish for, catch or kill any pickeral (dore) from the fifteenth day of April to the fifteenth day of May in each year, both days inclusive."
