#### METHODISTS PLAN A \$3,500,000 TEMPLE

Vast Structure to Be Erected in Heart of Chicago Loop District.

Chicago, May 26 .- As a monument to the centenary of their denominational mission work, the Methodists of Chicago will erect in the heart of the downtown business section a \$3,500,000 cathedral like no other in the world.

It will be a skyscraper 21 stories high, with offices occupying the space not given to the huge auditorium on the ground floor and church headquarters above. Rising from the roof of the 260-foot building will be a spire 140 feet high.

Great chimes in the spire, large enough to dominate the roar of loop traffic, will summon worshippers to the cathedral. The cathedral will be pure French Gothic in style.
