BURGLARIES CLEARED UP MAY SUE FOR A DIVORCE

When a Kitchener Resident Floors One Thief in His Home.

Kitchener, May 26.—Two Kitchener youths, L. Wismer and Harold Stahl, each about eighteen years of age, were arrested in a sensational manner by the city police, and many mysterious burglaries of the past eight months have been cleared up.

The young burglars had entered the house of August Frank, 31 Roy street, and were in the act of ransacking the drawers of the buffet in the dining room when Mr. Frank entered. Stahl leaped through the dining-room window, making a temporary escape, while young Wismer was overpowered and floored.

Mrs. Frank, who had been asleep upstairs, heard the commotion, and after ascertaining the cause telephoned the police, who were on the scene in quick order.

Wismer told the police the name of his accomplice, and after over two hours' search they found young Stahl near his home on Cedar Grove. He was badly bruised by his escape from the window.

This morning the prisoners admitted to the police that they had been implicated in the numerous burglaries which have taken place here during the past eight months, of which there were between thirty and forty in Kitchener and Waterloo. They informed the police where the stolen articles could be found, and the constables have been kept busy during the day gathering the large assortment of watches, silverware, bicycles, auto equipment, jewellery and other valuables, until the police station this evening presents the appearance of a miniature departmental store.

Both Wismer and Stahl have been giving the police information respecting the deeds of each other, and in this way the stolen articles were recovered in the hiding places in various parts of the city.

Chief O'Neill stated today that the capture of the young thieves clears up the mystery. The parents of the two boys reside in the city.

A CANADIAN CLUB FOR OLD LONDON

Will Be Organized to Serve as Rallying Point For Sons of Dominion.

London, May 26.—The enterprising spirit which has led to the organization of the Canadian chamber of commerce in London is now finding expression in a proposal to establish a Canadian Club here on the same lines as those in New York and elsewhere. At a well attended luncheon under the chairmanship of Col. E. R. Wayland, of Port Arthur, it was agreed that the Canadians in London should follow the example of the Australians and South Africans by organizing a club which would serve as a rallying point for the sons of the dominion. F. C. Wade, agent general for British Columbia, claimed that the club already bearing the name of Canada was not serving the interests of the dominion in the fullest sense. Other speakers expressed the sentiment, held in some quarters, that the older organization had become somewhat of a "lost corporation," and that it should either demote and Canadianize itself, or else give way to a newer organization on different lines.

METHODISTS PLAN A \$3,500,000 TEMPLE

Vast Structure to Be Erected in Heart of Chicago Loop District.

Chicago, May 26.—As a monument to the centenary of their denominational mission work, the Methodists of Chicago will erect in the heart of the downtown business section a \$3,500,000 cathedral like no other in the world.

It will be a skyscraper 21 stories high, with offices occupying the space not given to the huge auditorium on the ground floor and church headquarters above. Rising from the roof of the 260-foot building will be a spire 140 feet high.

Great chimneys in the spire, large enough to dominate the roar of loop traffic, will summon worshippers to the cathedral. The cathedral will be pure French Gothic in style.

Strikes Spreading in Petrograd.

Riga, May 26.—Independent advices received here from Petrograd confirm reports that the strikes in that city are spreading and that the statue of Volodarsky, the first Communist commissar of Petrograd, was blown to pieces during a demonstration of Bolshevik sailors on May 15. A Narva dispatch, telling of events up to May 18, says:

"In Petrograd events are in full swing. The factories are not working, but are striking, and they have been joined by red army men. In the streets, meetings pass resolutions demanding the calling of a constituent assembly."

Dry Agents Sentenced To Prison.

Rochester, N.Y., May 26.—Albert Horie and John P. Furey, both of Brooklyn, and formerly prohibition enforcement agents in this federal district, were sentenced to terms of one year and one day in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., by District Judge John R. Hazel. Both were convicted by a jury last week of extortion from Rochester saloon keepers.

New York, May 26.—When James A. Stillman and his wife, Mrs. Anne Erquhart Stillman, have signed the agreement that will result in the former banker's withdrawing his divorce action, Mrs. Stillman will begin a suit for divorce and alimony, it was said on good authority.

She will name Mrs. Florence Leeds, according to report, and the only defense will be the usual formal denial. Because the alimony question would be finally settled in this suit, it is not believed the amount to be settled on Mrs. Stillman in the pending agreement will be any barrier to the latter's acceptance.

Mrs. Stillman is understood to have told her attorneys she does not desire to remarry, and that it would not be for this she would bring a suit. "I wouldn't marry the best man alive," she is said to have declared.

When Mr. Stillman has dropped his suit and paid all the costs, it was estimated today, his divorce action will have cost him between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000. A factor in inducing him to open negotiations to settle, it is said, was the pressure of men of wealth and prominence, who convinced him it was better to make concessions than to have more publicity.

Another reported cause is said to be his discovery that the defense had obtained two batches of letters alleged to have been written to a woman who had not figured publicly in the suit. There is another story of a nurse who is said to have tried several times to see him at his office, and who was so insistent she once was placed in a taxicab by a special officer, and a revolver fell from her coat. She is said to have admitted she did not have it for the purpose of self-defense.

In subsequent developments, the story goes, two checks figured, one for \$5,000 and another for \$2,500. This woman is said to have aligned herself on the side of Mrs. Stillman recently.

The agreement for a settlement was not signed yesterday at the conference of attorneys in the case, but there seemed to be no thing of a nature that could not be straightened out in due time.

EIGHT PER CENT. DEBENTURES

Will Offer in England Canada Steamships Bonds

London, May 26.—It is understood that it is the intention of the Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, to offer on the British market, within the course of a day or two, one million pounds of eight per cent. debentures. The issue will be offered at 95, and it is probable that Dunn-Fisher will handle it. Arrangements for this raising of new money from the British investing public were made by J. W. Norcross, president of the company, when here recently.

ANOTHER BUTTER RECORD

Wonder Cow Finishes Seven-Day Mark for 30-Pound Test.

Ithaca, N.Y., May 26.—Glista Ernestine, the wonder cow of the State College of Agriculture, yesterday finished another seven day official record of 30.95 pounds of butter, making her a world's record cow with no close competitor. This is the seventh 30-pound record that Glista has completed in seven-day tests. No other cow in the world has approached this mark.
