THIS COUNTY LOOK-UP LIKE GAMBLERS' DEN Sheriff Allowed Poker Games and Took Inmates on Trips.

Albany, N.Y., May 25.—Testimony that Sheriff John Selley, Jr., of Rensselaer county had paid a discharged prisoner \$50 in settlement of a poker debt incurred while the prisoner was an inmate of the county jail, that prisoners had accompanied him on trips to Philadelphia and Syracuse.

Undersheriff George T. Morris told the committee that when Herbert Craig, a prisoner, was released on March 19th, he was given a check for \$50 by the sheriff.

The undersheriff said that frequently the sheriff took prisoners with him on trips to other cities. James Costo formerly employed at the jail and suspended by Sheriff Selley two weeks ago testified that the sheriff knew the prisoners were gambling but did not care.

Death of Rev. H. Symonds. Montreal, May 26.—Following a mild attack of pneumonia supervening on a serious operation performed here three weeks ago, the Rev. Herbert Symonds, vicar of Christ Church Cathedral, died Tuesday night in the

Montreal-General Hospital. He was born in 1860 in Suffolk, England, and came to Canada at the age of 21, graduating at Trinity College, Toronto, in 1886. He was ordained priest in 1887, and lectured at

Trinity for five years. In 1892 he became rector of St. Luke's, Toronto, and in 1901 took the headmastership of Trinity school, Port Hope. He was appointed vicar of Christ Church Cathedral in 1903.

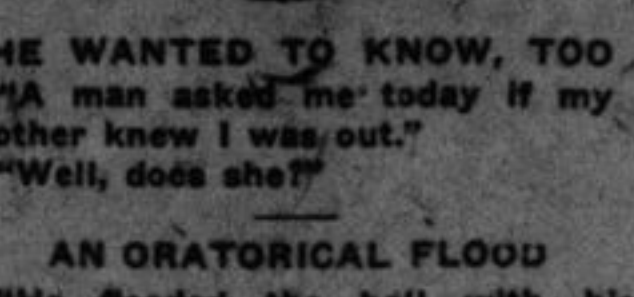
