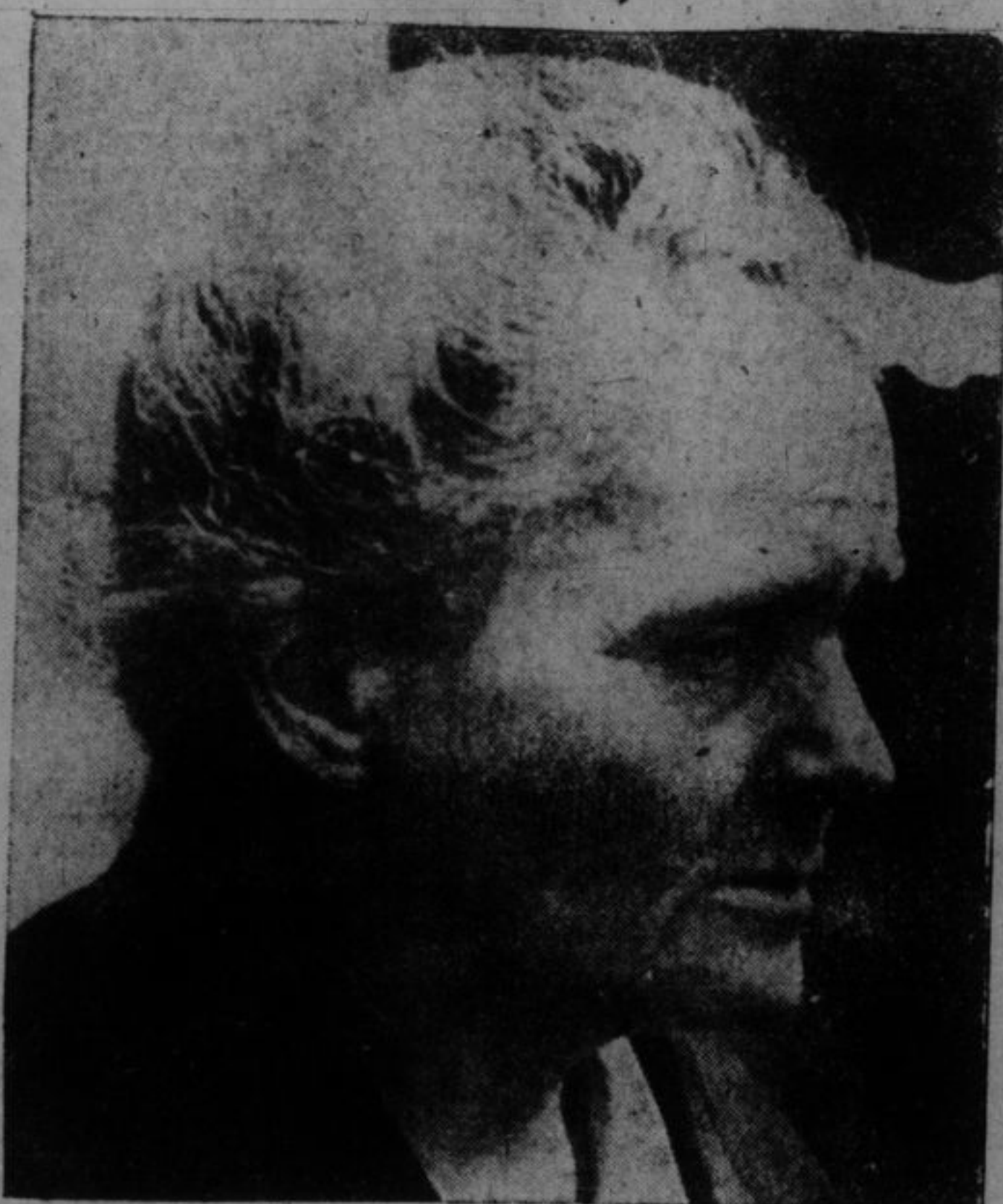

ENDS ADVERTISING FOR IMMIGRATION

Province of Ontario Closes Down Publicity Work in Britain.

London, May 27.—Although Ontario is one of the three Canadian provinces for which the dominion immigration office here will still accept immigrants, the provincial government has taken the step of completely closing down its publicity work in Great Britain. This is a radical departure for a province which in the past has been one of the most active in organizing the immigration of farm workers.

As recently cabled by your correspondent, this rigid restriction of immigration is not favored in Anglo-Canadian circles here. It is pointed out that recent immigration figures published by the British government show that in 1918 Australia obtained nine British immigrants for every one who went to Canada, and in 1919 five for every one, although the cost of the voyage to Australia is considerably greater. It is apprehended that if Canada restricts British immigration now, when the surplus population is looking across the seas for new homes, the disparity in the future will be even greater.

WOMAN JUROR PUNISHED

Fined and Sent to Jail for Contempt of Court

Cleveland, May 27.—Mrs. Ellen Griffith, tentatively seated as a juror in the perjury trial of former Judge William H. McGannon, was banished from the jury, fined \$50 and costs and sentenced to ten days in jail by Common Pleas Judge Florence E. Allen, on a charge of contempt of court.

Mrs. Griffith was accused by Miss Catherine Chambers, a bailiff, of saying it would be worth \$500 to an organization of which Mrs. Griffith is a member if McGannon was found guilty.

While being examined as a tentative juror Mrs. Griffith swore that she had not talked with anyone concerning the case.

McGannon is charged with giving perjured testimony during his two trials for the killing of Harold C. Kagy, of which he was acquitted.

Wheat Crop Menaced

New York, May 27.—Unless there is a quick change for the better in the weather in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, the estimate of 630,000,000 bushels of winter wheat must be materially reduced, says the Wall Street Journal. Reports from that section indicate a rapid deterioration of the crop, due in most of the territory to dry weather, and in other parts, curiously enough, to too much rain.

TO CLOSE THE BORDER TO U.S. WORKMEN

25 Painters From States Refused Admittance For Job at Fort Erie.

Buffalo, N.Y., May 27.—Following the refusal of the Canadian immigration authorities at Fort Erie to admit twenty-five painters from the states into Canada to decorate the Fort Erie race track, it is said that plans are under way by the American officials to be just as technical on this side of the river when Canadians, working in Buffalo and frontier towns, attempt to gain entrance to the states.

Many of the painters who were denied admission to Canada were veterans of the world war. Some of them had been out of employment for several months. It was stated by the Canadian immigration authorities that the men were denied admission to the dominion under the contract labor provision of the Canadian laws, which provides that labor cannot be imported for a Canadian job.

"These men brought the trouble upon themselves," the Canadian inspector in charge said. "They told us that they were only going to be over here for a few hours. They did not explain that they were going to take a job. If they had been honest with us we could have saved them a lot of trouble. The United States has a similar law, and Canadians have been stopped by the carloads at the International bridge."

Is in Real Estate

On Small Scale

Doorn, May 27.—The former German emperor has made himself extremely unpopular in the eyes of the people of Doorn by an attempt to sell, as building ground, a strip of woods belonging to his estate, but outside his fences and therefore useless to him.

The Dutch government, on learning of his intention to sell the woodland in small allotments in order to add to his income, prohibited the felling of the trees in that place, while the Doorn municipality this afternoon bought at auction the woodland in question, thus preserving it for the public in its natural state.

FEWER ACCIDENTS

Short Skirts Boon to Women, But Male Disadvantage

Chicago, May 27.—Short skirts may lessen the number of accidents to women, but they increase injuries to men.

This was the reply made by Chicago reformers to the claim of Frederick Rex, city statistician, that short skirts had reduced the number of accidents to women. In 1916, when skirts were long, 467 women were injured alighting from street cars, but in 1920 only 302 were hurt. In boarding street cars, 432 were injured in 1916, compared with 203 in 1920.

As for the men, more were injured in 1920 than in 1916 because they were not looking where they were going.
